

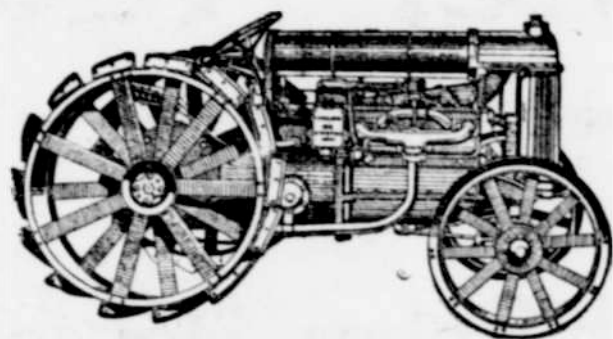

SUMMONS FOR PUBLICATION IN FORECLOSURE OF TAX LIEN.

Geo. F. Garoutte, Plaintiff, vs. Viola Garoutte and George Garoutte, heirs at law of Viola Garoutte, deceased, Defendants.

To Viola Garoutte and Geo. Garoutte, the above named defendants.

In the name of the State of Oregon, you are hereby notified that Geo. F. Garoutte, the holder of Certificate of Delinquency numbered 1762 issued on the 6th day of April, 1918, by the Tax Collector of the County of Lane, State of Oregon, for the amount of Twelve and 69-100 Dollars, the same being the amount then due and delinquent for taxes for the year 1916 together with penalty, interest and costs thereon upon the real property assessed to you, of which you are the owner as appears of record, situated in said County and State, and particularly bound and described as follows, to-wit: Lot No. 8 in Block No. 3 in Perkins' Addition to Cottage Grove, Lane County, Oregon.

1919 tax, paid April 5, 1920, tax receipt No. 9240, for \$12.85, interest at 12 per cent.

Said Viola Garoutte and Geo. Garoutte, as the owners of the legal title of the above described property as the same appears of record, and each of the other persons above named are hereby further notified that Geo. F. Garoutte will apply to the Circuit Court of the County and State aforesaid for a decree foreclosing the lien against the property above described and mentioned in said certificate.
