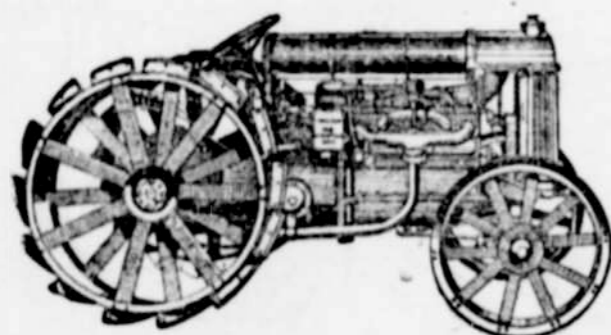

BUREAU OF MINES CONDUCTS EXPERIMENTS WITH OREGON COAL

Experiments to determine the commercial value of the subbituminous and lignite coals distributed throughout 13 counties of Oregon are being conducted by the Oregon bureau of mines and geology. Promising results have already been indicated. Thus far there have been derived from these coals a fuel gas, also a coke that is satisfactory for all industrial purposes and for domestic use in the form of briquettes. Gasoline substitute, lubricating oil and other products are expected to be developed by further refining of the coal derivatives.

The coals which form the subject of these experiments have never been utilized on a commercial scale because, although they are available in large quantities, they cannot compete in the market with higher grades of coal, even with much higher prices commanded by the latter. The purpose of the bureau of mines and geology in this research is to find commercial uses for this Oregon natural resource which is practically untouched.

Coal measures of sufficient volume to warrant development have been found in the following Oregon counties: Baker, Clackamas, Clatsop, Columbia, Coos, Douglas, Grant, Jackson, Lane, Lincoln, Tillamook, Washington and Wheeler.

Price of Hogs Very Low.

Twelve cents a pound was the price received for the carload of hogs shipped last week from Lane county to Portland by the Grange Co-operative Shipping association, according to W. A. Ayres, manager of the association.
Mr. Ayres says that the outlook for a higher price in the near future is not very bright and he thought it would be some time before the farmers of the coast will be able to make anything out of their hogs.

"In the middle west, where the price of corn has come down the farmers may be able to make something off their hogs at this price, but here on the coast where feed prices are still high the farmers can make nothing at all on pork and stand to lose something at this price."

Steak, Southern Style.

One pound round or sirloin steak, 1 onion, 1 cup hot water, 1 cup tomatoes (or commercial tomato soup).
Flour steak heavily. Fry in very hot grease until light brown. Take out and put in onion cut in thin slices. Stir until brown. Pour in hot water. Add tomatoes. When boiling put back steam, edger and let simmer gently until tender, about 15 minutes. Never let boil hard or the steak will be fiber with the essence in the gravy. This is excellent and economical, for tough steaks are rendered delicious. Liver may be cooked the same way.
