Average Wage Is Doubled.

New York, Nov. 29.—Average earnings in this city's representative trades in September, 1920, were double what they were six years ago, generally, and \$2 a week higher than they were a year ago, according to a report prepared by the industrial bureau of the Merchants' association. The report declares that, while the city's industrial activity has receded somewhat from the high water mark established during the war, there is no indication of a general slump in manufacturing. Charts giving the average weekly earnings of workmen, combining both office and shop employees, for September, 1914, 1919 and 1920, show, for the above named years respectively:

Stone, clay and glass products, \$13.96, \$26.58, \$35.11; metals, machinery and conveyances, \$14.50, \$27.21, \$30.67; wood manufacturers, \$12.49, \$24.26, \$28.42; fur, leather and rubber goods, \$11.77, \$27.09, \$26.43; chemicals, oils and paints, \$13.67, \$24.79, \$27; printing and paper goods, \$15.58, \$27.36, \$31.38; textiles, \$9.72, \$21.03, \$24.79; clothing, millinery, laundry, etc., \$12.40, \$27.68, \$26.46; food, liquors and tobacco, \$11.60, \$23.40, \$26.04; water, light and power, \$15.79, \$30.91, \$35.59.

The general average of these industries for the three years runs \$13.06, \$26.17, \$28.49.

How a Freight Car Spends Its Time.

Figuring that the average round trip of a freight car is 16.56 days, this is how that period is divided, according to a computation made by L. E. Loree, president of the Delaware & Hudson company:

Road improvement 10.4 per cent; road delays 1 per cent; in intermediate yards 13 per cent; interchange between roads 16.8 per cent; between terminals and loading tracks 12.5 per cent; between yard and storage tracks 4.8 per cent; under repair 8.9 per cent. This makes a total of 67.4 per cent, or 11.16 out of the 16.56 days. The remainder of the time is consumed in this way: held by shipper 24.2 per cent; reassignment 3 per cent; delays due to holidays and Sundays 5.4 per cent.—Pacific Semaphore.
