Deputy Sheriff George Croner's acute sense of hearing led to the prevention of a wholesale delivery of prisoners at the county jail.

Tuesday evening about dusk the deputy sheriff, while in the rear of the building heard a rather strange noise inside. He sensed mischief and obtaining the assistance of W. G. Judkins, of the local police force, entered the jail and made an examination of the walls, while Judkins stood watch at the door. Croner found that the steel lining of the west wall beneath one of the lower windows had been pried loose directly beneath the window sill and had been bent back at right angles, exposing the bare brick wall. He says there was enough room for the prisoners to crawl through, once a hole had been dug through the wall.
