HARDING RESIGNS AS SENATOR FROM OHIO

Retirement to Take Effect Six Weeks Before Inauguration.

Marion, O.—President-elect Harding resigned as senator from Ohio, forwarding his letter of resignation to Columbus for action of the newly elected republican governor, Harry L. Davis, who assumed office Monday.

Mr. Harding made January 15 the effective date of his resignation, or six weeks before his inauguration.

In the interest of national thrift, President-elect Harding requested officials arranging for his inauguration to abandon all plans for an inaugural ceremony.

In a telegram to Mr. McLean, Mr. Harding declared he preferred simply to take the oath of office, deliver a brief address and then take up his duties. He said it would make his position very unhappy if the outlay for an elaborate inaugural created the impression of extravagance.

He also telegraphed Senator Knox of Pennsylvania, in charge of the congressional end of the plans, suggesting that the proposal to erect stands on the capitol grounds be abandoned. This proposal has been the subject of heated debate in congress.

INCREASE OF 48 IN HOUSE IS PROPOSED

Washington.—Membership of the house will be increased to 483 under a bill reported by Chairman Sirog of the census committee to fix the reapportionment for ten years under the 1920 census. The bill would mean an increase of 48 over the present membership. No state would lose any representation.

California would make the largest gain of new members, five, bringing her total to 16. Michigan, New York, Ohio and Pennsylvania would gain four each. Illinois and Texas three, Massachusetts, New Jersey and North Carolina two each; while Alabama, Arkansas, Connecticut, Georgia, Maryland, Minnesota, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Oregon, South Carolina, Tennessee, Virginia, Washington, West Virginia and Wisconsin would gain one each.

The basis of representation is fixed at one member for each 218,979 inhabitants as compared to 211,873 as at present.

"CHINA EGG" LAW IS VALID

Supreme Court Says State Has Right to Require Signs.

Olympia, Wash.—The so-called "China egg" law, requiring hotels, restaurants and other places that use foreign eggs in the preparation of food, or that serve foreign eggs, to advise the public of that fact by a "plainly readable sign" was upheld as constitutional in a decision handed down by the state supreme court.

The decision reverses the ruling of the Thurston county superior court in the suit brought by Parrott and company, egg importers of San Francisco, to enjoin the state commissioner of agriculture and other state officials from enforcing the law. The lower court granted the injunction but the supreme court ordered it dissolved, holding the law to be a proper exercise of the police power of the state.

Bond House May Pay Half Loss.

Portland, Or.—Estimated roughly on the basis of the complete list of creditors prepared by attorneys for the receiver W. D. Whitcomb that the assets would total about \$1,500,000, Morris Brothers, Inc., bankrupt bond house, stands to pay about a little better than 50 cents on the dollar. The list of creditors, prepared for filing in federal court shows totals which aggregate \$2,814,619, or \$1,314,619 more than the receiver's estimate of assets.

Portland Butter Makers Fined \$5000.

Portland, Or.—For manufacturing and selling adulterated butter during two years in violation of the federal law, which requires a special license and payment of a special tax, the Hazelwood company was fined \$5000 by United States District Judge Bean. The company was convicted in the local federal court on two counts, and Judge Bean fined the butter makers \$2500 on each count.

U. S. Withdraws from Conference.

Washington.—The United States it was learned authoritatively has decided to withdraw from the council of ambassadors which has been meeting continuously in Paris to consider the armistice question and questions growing out of the peace treaty. The five powers, Great Britain, France, Italy, Japan and the United States, were represented in the council.

SPECIALISTS IN HUMAN ILLS

Some More or Less Sage Reflections on the Subject of Diseases and Their Treatment.

Dentists now cure rheumatism, dyspepsia, kidney troubles, sore eyes and corns by pulling, filling or otherwise mistreating the teeth. Stomach specialists relieve toothache by treating the digestion. Headaches have nothing to do with the head, except to make it hurt; the seat of their operations is in the stomach or liver. The whole body seems to be merely a system of interlocking directorates, the Philadelphia Ledger comments.

Why, then, one is inclined to ask, do we have specialists? If the functions of the body, instead of being a system of such complete entanglements and inter-relations from head to foot, were really divided up into watertight compartments, then specialist treatment would indeed be indicated. In that case each specialist would have his own compartment to look after, with a sign upon the membrane which marks the entrance to his domain, "Trespassers will be prosecuted." But what are you going to do with a body in which nephritis is directly caused by an ulcerated tooth which the dentist hasn't discovered, and the legs swell up and become useless because there is an unlocated intestinal kink? It would really seem that before a man is fitted to operate as a specialist on any part of the body he must have specialized a while over every other part of it—so that the East side doctor's sign, "Specialist in All Diseases," need not be regarded as so absurd after all. The first qualification of a good specialist is to be an all-around physician.

But at present the dentist has the advantage over all other specialists. Give him a chance to pull out every tooth in your head and you will be delivered forever from Bright's disease, rheumatism, pleurisy, liver complaint, neuritis, pyelitis, and virtually every other kind of disease. But what will the dentist do when he has drawn everybody's teeth?

Good Hard Sense as Applied to Ancient Superstitions Concerning "Blue Monday."

I happened to find a most entertaining old book in the free library—a dictionary of superstitions. It has three big volumes, all crammed with the fears and beliefs of the human race. Just to sample some of them that apply to Monday, here are a few:

"If things commence to go wrong on Monday they will go wrong all the week, but if you have good luck on Monday you will keep it up."

"Pay no bills on Monday if you can help it."

(This is congenial advice and easily followed.)

"If the sun sets clear Friday night it will rain before Monday night."

"It is a bad sign to lose a tooth on Monday."

The next best thing to sunshine in this dull old country is a light which gives to the fowls the impression that the sun is shining.

Fortunately the fowl is easily deceived, with the result that a great deal of success has attended the experiments of a well-known engineer who is building fowl-houses with a material similar to canvas, stained and varnished so that the house is always lighted in the daytime with light of a pleasant golden color.
