HOW? Full directions on Form 1040A and Form 1040; also the law and regulations.

WHAT? Four per cent normal tax on taxable income up to \$4000 in excess of exemption. Eight per cent normal tax on balance of taxable income. Surplus from 1 per cent to 65 per cent on net incomes over \$5000.

Soldiers Get First Call.

Salem, Ore., Jan. 10.—All honorably discharged soldiers of Oregon, regardless of whether they fought in the World war, the Spanish-American war or some other war, have preferential rights for a period of 90 days to purchase lands of the Pacific Live-stock company in Harney and Malheur counties, Oregon, according to an opinion of Attorney General Van Winkle, written for George G. Brown, clerk of the state land board.

The lands are to be sold under terms of an agreement entered into by the state and the Pacific Live-stock company. Setting litigation back by the state to recover on lands, which it was alleged, the company procured years ago by fraudulent means.
