DATE OF LICENSE LAW ENFORCEMENT POSTPONED

Peace officers throughout the state have been notified by Secretary of State Sam A. Koser to postpone enforcement of the law against any persons who have applied for motor vehicle licenses until January 26. The motor vehicle division of the department of state had expected to be able to catch up with the current work on January 15, but was unable to do so. It is now expected that, beginning on January 26, the department will be able to issue licenses on the same day that applications are received, and that on and after that date the law will be enforced against all who do not have their 1921 license plates.
