## ROW RIVER LUMBERMAN SPEAKS BEFORE NATIONAL TIE ASSOCIATION

J. S. Maglady, of the Bohemia Lumber company at Row River left Sunday for San Francisco, where he will attend a meeting of the National Association of Railroad Tie Producers.

Mr. Maglady will present a paper at this meeting on "The Necessity of the Small Mill in Tie Production," the principal features of which, according to Mr. Maglady, will be to advocate more hewn or partly sawed ties in order to conserve timber and prevent waste, and more grades of ties in the interests of economy cost and increased production. Mr. Maglady will also discuss the matter of lumber side cut for these small mills, which is sold in competition with Douglas fir and detrimental to its interests. His address will be illustrated by about 40 lantern slides, showing the methods of logging and milling by the average small mill in Oregon as well as the more modern methods. Mr. Maglady will also have an opportunity of calling attention of numerous lumbermen in attendance to the part which Lane county plays in the general lumbering business.

The National Association of Railroad Tie Producers is the largest association of its kind in the United States and its membership represents an annual output of more than 60,000,000 ties. There is expected to be a large attendance from all of the lumber-producing sections of the country and on that account Mr. Maglady's address, illustrated with lantern slides, will be a means of advertising Western Oregon's lumber industry among them.

## FARMER HAWKINS ON WAY HOME WITH CAR PARADE

J. L. Hawkins, whose home is near Eugene, is the owner of a family of Fords as the result of a wager on the California-Ohio football game at Pasadena, January 1.

Mr. Hawkins, who is an enthusiastic supporter of California, so the story goes, bet a 1918 Cadillac against seven Fords that California would beat Ohio by at least two touchdowns. He won. The proud owner of the procession picks up hikers along the road to steer his machines and keep them in the straight and narrow path.

## THIRTEEN U. OF O. GRADUATES IN SENATE AND LEGISLATURE

University of Oregon, Eugene, Jan. 24.—Five members of the Oregon state senate for 1921 and eight members of the house are University of Oregon alumni, according to the Oregon Voter of January 1. This total of 13 leads all other universities and colleges represented in the legislature; the next in line being Willamette with seven members in the house.

Senators who received their early training in the University are: Robert S. Farrell, re-elected for the sixth time from Multnomah county; F. H. Porter, of Portland, serving his fifth term; W. W. Banks, serving in the senate for his second session; O. B. Robertson, who hails from Condon, and Jay Upton, of Prineville, in for the first term.

## "SHADOW" EMPLOYED BY TWO CITIZENS OF SALEM

Salem Statesman: Joe, Bailey, alias George Billings, hunted by Portland detectives on suspicion of being "Shadow" or "Talkative Burglar," or both, who has terrorized Portland in recent weeks, is believed to be a man who was employed by two Salem men in Portland during the Pacific International Livestock exposition and the Portland Poultry show. His Salem employes were E. A. Rhoten of the Pacific Homestead, who employed Bailey during the livestock show as a subscription solicitor, and W. C. Connor, editor of the Northwest Poultry Journal, who employed him in a similar capacity for that publication during the poultry show.

For each, however, Bailey was employed only a few hours. He was found to be tricky, the Salem men say, and is believed to have taken the money for his own use on Homestead subscriptions which were not turned in.
