TELEGRAPH COMPANY SUES CONTRACTORS

Alleging that its telephone and telegraph lines extending along the highway between Soginaw and Cottage Grove were damaged and put out of commission at intervals by blasting while the new highway was under course of construction during the summer and fall of 1919, the Postal Telegraph company yesterday began suit against the Western Construction company, the highway contractors, for damages.

It is alleged that between June 1, 1919, and October 31, 1919, the defendant frequently set off blasts in close proximity to the plaintiff's lines and damaged them and interrupted the telephone and telegraph service. It is alleged that on account of such interruption of service the company lost business to the amount of \$793.40 and

LANE TAXES TO BE 20 PER CENT HIGHER THIS YEAR

Taxes to be collected in Lane county this year amount to \$1,474,625.58, according to the certificate of the tax rolls filed by Assessor Herbert E. Walker in the office of County Clerk R. S. Bryson yesterday. Sheriff Stickle's tax deputies are now busy writing receipts for 1920 taxes and will begin sending them out soon. Collections will begin March 1.

The receipts show that there is a heavy increase in taxes this year over those of last, due to increased levies for state and county purposes, school purposes and city purposes, the heaviest increase being in the state taxes, due to the large appropriations of money voted by the legislature and the people at the polls.

The state and county levy for this county last year was 18.675 mills; for this year it is 24.2 mills. The taxes to be collected in Lane county this year are divided as follows, according to the certificate filed by Assessor Walker:

Mr. Hawley Will Not Serve.

WILL TAX ALL SALES OF CAPITAL ASSETS AS INCOME

Numerous inquiries have reached the bureau of internal revenue relative to the decision of United States Court of Connecticut in the Brewster case, in which it was held that gains and profits realized from the sale of capital assets is not taxable income. The United States attorney for Connecticut has been authorized to perfect an appeal to the supreme court of the United States for a review of the decision. Since congress, under the provisions of the income tax acts of 1913, 1916 and 1918, has directed the taxation as income of such gains and profits, the bureau will continue to collect the tax thereon, unless and until the supreme court shall hold that provision of law to be unconstitutional.

The same question is involved in the Eldorado and Ryerson cases which were argued in the supreme court some weeks ago. A decision in these cases undoubtedly will settle the general question. In view of the severe penalties provided by law for false and fraudulent income tax returns, taxpayers are warned not to omit from their returns for the year 1920 such gains and profits.

Aviators Are Oregon Men.

Washington, Feb. 19.—Oregon has a direct interest in the effort that is being made by army aviators to cross the continent in 24 hours. Lieutenant Pearson, whose effort failed because of engine trouble and who was forced to descend in a wild section of Texas, is a resident of Portland and a graduate of the university at Eugene. Lieutenant William D. Coney, who will attempt the transcontinental flight in the other direction on Washington's birthday, received a valuable part of his training as a pilot in the Oregon forest patrol, operating out of the Medford sub-base last summer. Lieutenant Coney will start from San Diego on the morning of February 22, and will try to reach Jacksonville, Florida, within 24 hours.
