City Council

Council met in regular session March 7. All present.

On motion, resignation of Elbert Bede as member of the library board was accepted.

Petition received for paving of the alley first north of Main street. On motion ordinance was ordered drawn for the paving of this alley between Fifth and Seventh streets.

Petition received for paving of M street with class A macadam was granted and city attorney ordered to draw ordinance.

Matter of storm sewer in north M street from end of present cement sewer to the northern boundary of the west side school property was referred to the city engineer for estimate of its probable cost.

Reports of city recorder, marshal and treasurer read and filed.

The matter of the condition of street assessments and records was brought up and left for adjustment with the finance committee and recorder.

Recorder was instructed to have actions started for the collection of all Main street paving assessments not paid within 30 days.

The street commissioner was ordered to serve cement sidewalk notice upon Theo. Baker.

Street commissioner ordered to inspect condition of sidewalk around Methodist church to Third street.

Mr. Umphrey appeared on behalf of the commercial club to ask assistance of city in financing improvements at city park. Motion prevailed that it be the sense of the council that item of \$400 be placed in the next city budget for the purpose of constructing toilet and septic tank and providing drainage.

Street commissioner ordered to take in hand matter of easier approach at west end of Main street bridge, engineer ordered to make estimate of probable cost and city attorney to secure consent of property owners.

City attorney ordered to prepare charter amendment raising minimum fine for violation of prohibition laws from \$100 to \$250, to be presented to the people at the next election.

Finance committee granted further time to arrange method for collection of water rents.

Light committee granted further time in arranging replacement of arc lights with smaller lights.

In the matter of the complaint that someone had stopped the natural drainage in the vicinity of the Standard Oil company's plant, T. G. Sudtoll.

Tested Recipes

Lemon Sherbet Cake—One cup sugar, one egg, three-fourths cup sweet milk, one-fourth cup melted butter, one teaspoon cream tartar, one-half teaspoon soda, one and one-half cups flour; bake in two layers. Sour milk may be used by omitting the cream of tartar. For the filling: one egg well beaten, juice and grated rind of one lemon; cook in double boiler until blended and thickened; remove from fire and mix with enough powdered sugar to spread; mix a little thicker for top of cake.

Open Sandwiches—Rye bread, eight slices of tomato, white meat of chicken or thinly sliced cold roast pork, two hard-boiled eggs, hearts of lettuce, aspic jelly, mayonnaise, cream cheese dressing. On a luncheon plate put a

piece of buttered rye bread; cover it with meat. Chicken and cold boiled ham can be used in alternating pieces. On each sandwich put two slices of tomato. Sprinkle chopped hard-boiled egg over the tomato. In a curled lettuce leaf put a spoonful of mayonnaise and place this on one side of the plate. In another leaf put a spoonful of aspic jelly. Pour over the whole a generous spoonful of cream cheese dressing.

Cinnamon Buns—One pint flour, one tablespoon sugar, one teaspoon salt, two level teaspoons baking powder. Mix all together. Mix in two tablespoons lard and butter, wet with milk for soft dough. Roll out one-half inch thick, spread with melted butter, powdered sugar and cinnamon. Roll out and cut in inch slices and put in greased pans. Bake 20 minutes in hot oven.
