WILL CONDUCT PROSPECTS OVER THE STATE

State Chamber of Commerce Has Plan for Showing Immigrants What We Have Here.

Portland, Ore., March 26.—(Special)—A comprehensive and far-reaching program for bringing settlers to Oregon on a wholesale scale from the middle western states during the coming summer was announced by the Oregon state chamber of commerce yesterday following an all-afternoon meeting of the executive committee. This plan, which has been in the making for several months, includes the routing of hundreds of homeseekers to Oregon in a body and personally-conducted tours by automobile over the entire state.

The state chamber will devote its entire energy and resources to the task of putting this plan through effectively during the coming spring and summer.

Briefly, the program adopted by the board of directors is as follows: Early this spring agents will be sent to canvass the middle western states, including the Dakotas, Iowa, Kansas, Nebraska, Colorado, Wyoming, Montana and Utah, for the purpose of interviewing prospective immigrants who are contemplating a move westward. Advice received by the state chamber during the past few months indicate that this westward movement will be on a larger scale this summer than in former years and these advance agents will gather together a large group to move to Oregon on a fixed schedule and a certain date.

It is believed that a party of at least 500 prospective settlers could be grouped together in this way and brought to Oregon in a body. Definite assurances have been given by the railroads that they will cooperate in every way with the proposed plan. Homeseekers' rates which were suspended during the war were put into effect again last Tuesday following a conference of railroad officials at Omaha.

Taking advantage of these rates, which permit of stop-overs at any point en route, the party of homeseekers would arrive in Oregon, the rail trip coming to an end at the most advantageous point. From that point a personally-conducted tour over the entire state by automobile would begin. Upon arrival in Oregon the party would be entertained by the various commercial organizations along the route. Advance preparations would be made for their reception and each community would endeavor to impress the visitors with the attractions they have to offer. Data will be compiled relative to all branches of the state's resources, especially in regard to the possibilities of the various communities through which the party will be shown.

RUSSIA IS DENIED AMERICAN TRADE

Big Changes In Economic System Prerequisite to Renewing Relations.

Washington, D. C.—The American government notified the soviet authorities in Russia that resumption of trade between Russia and the United States could not be considered until fundamental changes had been made in the economic system underlying the soviet regime.

Safety of human life, guaranty of property rights, free labor and observance of the sanctity of contracts were among the requirements laid down in a note by Secretary Hughes as essential if trade relations are to be renewed.

The communication added that "convincing evidence of the consummation of such changes" must be furnished before this government cared even to discuss the subject.

The note was in reply to the appeal recently addressed by the soviet regime to President Harding and congress asking that trade relations between the United States and Russia be restored and proposing to send a delegation to the United States to negotiate.

Unlike previous official pronouncements of the American government's attitude toward the soviet regime, Secretary Hughes' note dealt solely with the economic aspects of the problem, and made no attempt to discuss the political shortcomings of the unrecognized bolshevist government.

WILL PROBE CARE OF DISABLED VETERANS

Washington, D. C.—President Harding has decided to have an exhaustive investigation made of government care of disabled war veterans. Within a few days he will select a special committee of inquiry.

The president, it was said, was determined to lay the situation before congress and the country to correct possible abuses. The investigators will be instructed to recommend any remedial legislation.

Twelve thousand government beds throughout the country have been found available for ex-service men, and will soon be utilized for relief of many suffering former soldiers, President Harding announced after the cabinet meeting. The president some time ago appealed to all department heads to look into the hospital situation in view of the shortage complained of for proper care of ailing ex-service men. Heads of departments by checking up all facilities, he said, had discovered a total of about 12,000 waiting beds that can soon be of service. This, the president hoped, would go far toward relieving suffering among afflicted soldiers.

CAPITOL CALLS LIMITED

President to See Casual Visitors on Three Days of Week.

Washington, D. C.—Office seekers, inventors of reform panaceas, and even members of congress and others who want to ask favors or dispense advice at the White House must make their calls on Monday, Wednesday or Friday hereafter, if they hope to see President Harding.

This announcement was made in accord with a decision by the president that he was giving too much time to visitors who have thronged the executive offices ever since inauguration. The demand on his time has been so great that he has spent many night hours at work on correspondence and other pressing business.

Greeks Advance Into Turkish Territory

Constantinople.—The Greeks are making notable progress in their offensive against the Turkish Nationalists, according to word received here. The Turks are withdrawing slowly into the mountain fastnesses defending Eski-Shehr and Afium-Karahissar, where they are expected to make their final stand, unless they are able to hold the Greeks in the treacherous passes in the valleys.

Diplomatic Aides Must Be Americans.

Washington, D. C.—Heads of all American diplomatic missions have been notified by the state department that they must get rid of all non-American attaches by July 1. The full Americanization of embassies and legations was provided for in the last diplomatic appropriation measure.

Communists Met By U. S. Forces.

Coblenz.—A communist uprising occurred Monday morning in the American bridgehead area at Montabaur, six miles northeast of Ehrenbreitstein. A riot call was answered by the provost marshal and American military police were dispatched to Montabaur to restore order.
