Chili Con Carne.

Chop fine one-fourth pound of mutton fat and put it into a pan until it sizzles, then add two pounds of lean mutton diced, and fry, seasoning only with salt until about one-third cooked. Add cayenne pepper, six sliced onions, two pints parboiled red or black beans, one-fourth of a lemon rind, four teaspoons soup stock and same quantity of water. Season with salt and whole black peppers. Boil until thick and serve hot.
