COUNTY TO SELL \$100,000 OF ITS HIGHWAY BONDS

The Lane county court will immediately issue \$100,000 of the \$2,000,000 bonds voted by the people at the special election last May. District Attorney Clyde N. Johnston has begun work on the papers necessary in the procedure and advertisements for bids for the sale of the bonds will at once be inserted in the newspapers. Bids will be opened April 25. The bonds will draw five per cent interest.

Fifty thousand dollars to be raised by the sale of the bonds will be used in the improvement of the McKenzie

river highway, matching a similar sum to be put up by the state highway commission. While members of the commission were in Eugene a few days ago they made a proposition to the Lane county court that \$100,000 be expended on the highway between Thurston and Blue River, the county and state to go 50-50 on the cost of the work.

Just where the other \$50,000 will be placed has not been announced but it is probable that part is for the Lorane road.
