LANE RECEIVES \$20,299.75 FROM AUTOMOBILE LICENSES

The sum of \$1,716,843.14 was distrib-
uted last week by the secretary of
state's office to the state highway
fund and to the counties, representing
receipts from motor vehicle, operator,
chauffeur and motor vehicle dealer
licenses from September 16, 1920, to
March 15, 1921, inclusive.

During that period the total receipts,
after deducting refunds on account of
duplications, was \$1,808,194.25. From
this amount is subtracted \$91,359.11,
representing the expense of adminis-
tering the law under which the receipt
and distribution of the money is made.
Of the net amount of \$1,716,843.14,
three-fourths go to the state highway
fund and one-fourth goes to the coun-
ties in proportion to the registrations
received from residents of the respec-
tive counties.

To the highway fund goes a total of
\$1,287,632.35, and the amount distrib-
uted to the 36 counties is \$429,210.79.
Multnomah county receives a total of
\$162,251.90, the largest amount ap-
portioned to any county, and Lincoln
county receives \$487.20, the smallest
amount apportioned to any county.
Lane county receives \$20,299.75, the
third highest amount in the state.

SEVENTEEN BABES AT FIRST COUNTY CLINIC

"A toothbrush is cheaper than a
doctor bill." It was to ascertain the
truth of this statement and many
others like it that 17 mothers took
their babies Saturday morning to the
first of the child welfare clinics con-
ducted in Eugene by the Lane county
public health association.

Seventeen babies were stripped down
and subjected to a careful scrutiny by
professional eyes to determine whether
the little bodies were growing toward
manhood and womanhood with a hand-
icap which, if not obviated, might re-
sult in a blighting of an otherwise
perfect piece of workmanship. And
under those expert eyes were found in
just those 17 cases two where little
hearts were not working as they should;
others who, when placed on the scales,
did not show the proper weight which
comes from healthy masses of flesh
about arms and legs and ribs; and still
others whose breathing was impaired
from bad tonsils or adenoids.

Seventeen mothers went home yester-
day, some the eight or ten miles they
had come to bring their babies to the
clinic, with a certain knowledge still
more certain that corrective measures
should be taken with the aid of the
family physician.

And that is the purpose of the clini-
c as outlined by Miss Mozelle Hair,
chairman of the health association.
"Give the parents a knowledge of
what is wrong and they will see to
having it corrected," said Miss Hair.
"The work is educational in that we
give no treatment but only a thor-
ough examination and a statement of
condition."

Clinics will be held every Saturday
morning in Eugene with the aim in
view of eventually expanding the work
to take in the county health centers
already organized by Miss Brownell's
work.

STATE LEVY CAUSE OF BIG INCREASE IN TAXES HERE

It is an every day occurrence at the
office of Sheriff Stickels for the tax
deputies to be asked why taxes are so
high this year. In many cases taxes
are just twice as high as they were
last year and there is, of course, a great
deal of complaint. Sheriff Stickels, in
a statement issued recently regarding
the cause of this great increase, says:
"For the past several years there
has been a general trend upward in the
amount of tax levied and collected.
Compare the following figures and note
particularly the amount of state tax:

"You will note that during the past
ten years the state tax has increased
over 561 per cent, while the amount of
tax levied for all other purposes, in-
cluding the market road construction
fund, special school and road district
levies, has increased only a frac-
tion over 91 per cent. And I believe
the last legislature appointed a com-
mittee to find other ways and means
for raising more money for state pur-
poses. Have you ever heard of a com-
mittee being appointed by anyone for
the purpose of raising less money for
state purposes?"

"I am wondering if the taxpayers
know that they are paying \$10,138.95
less money into the general fund of
the county than they did last year.
And do they know that they are paying
\$198,565.67 more for state purposes
than they did last year?"

"They are paying into the general
fund of the county only \$59,232.53
this year more than they did ten years
ago, or an increase of only a fraction
over 26 per cent."

"There is always an effort made to
blind and deceive the taxpayer by
talking about salaries paid the county
officials. Let me call attention to the
fact that the total paid out to
county officers as salaries does not
amount to a drop in the bucket in the
total amount of money collected as
taxes. The cause for taxes being high
comes from other sources."

SPEEDERS ON HIGHWAYS ARE TO BE PROSECUTED

Because of the many complaints
reaching the secretary of state's office
recently, T. A. Rafferty, in charge of
the field deputies of the automobile
department, announces that every ef-
fort will be made during the coming
summer to curb the activities of delin-
quent speeders on the highways.

On his return from Portland recently
Mr. Rafferty said he detected a num-
ber of traffic violations on the Pacific
highway, one autoist having covered a
distance of several miles at a rate of
more than 45 miles an hour. This man
was arrested and upon being arraigned
in the Salem courts was given a heavy
fine.

Letters received by the secretary of
state indicate that the courts through-
out the state are cooperating with
the field agents, and in a number of
cases fines are being supplemented by
jail sentences. With the number of
motor vehicles multiplying rapidly, and
the improvement of the highways
which permits speeding, Mr. Rafferty
said it was up to the state department
to enforce the traffic laws to the let-
ter.

The great majority of drivers, Mr.
Rafferty said, desire to obey the laws,
but there are others who pay little if
any attention to the traffic regula-
tions. The latter class of violators are
most sought in connection with the
campaign to abate speeding and elimi-
nate the many dangers confronting
travelers.

Health Nurse May Get Car.

A campaign for an increased mem-
bership in the Lane County Public
Health association and means of rais-
ing funds for the use of Miss Mary

Brownell, county health nurse, in her
trips about her district were subjects
brought up at a meeting of the as-
sociation Monday night in Eugene.

LAWFUL YEAR ROUND TO CATCH TEN-INCH TROUT

Interpretation of the new fish and
game code by enforcement officials
makes it lawful to fish the year round
for trout ten inches in length or over
from the mouth to the source of all
streams in the state which are affected
by tide water. The Willamette and
Siuslaw rivers come within this classi-
fication.

Announcement comes directly from
the offices of F. M. Brown, deputy
state game warden, who gives assur-
ance that wardens have been instruc-
ted to consider such fishing within the
law.

Former interpretation of the clause
in the laws in regard to "streams af-
fected by tide water" was taken to
mean only such parts of the streams as
were so affected. With such a ruling
accepted, fishing for ten-inch trout, ex-
cept in season, was prohibited in the
Willamette above Oregon City, the tide
water limit, and in the Siuslaw above
Mapleton, the highest point where salt
water has its effect.

The clause is now taken to mean,
according to the announcement, that
fishing is lawful from the mouth to
the source of all rivers so affected and
for the tract mentioned.

Leslie Farmer Taken to Hospital.

Eugene Register: Leslie Farmer, of
this city, who was injured in a rail-
road accident in Portland a short time
ago, one of his legs having been am-
putated at the knee and the toes of his
other foot being taken off, has been
sent to the Southern Pacific hospital
in San Francisco. He was a fireman
employed by the company when in-
jured.
