RULES FOR APPROPRIATE DRESS GIVEN BY GIRLS

Tacoma, Wash.—Rules stating what is appropriate and what is not appropriate in dress for high school girls have been issued by Tacoma high school girls, following two style shows they gave recently.

Some of the rules follow:

"Silk dresses are not suitable for school wear, no matter how simple, because some girls cannot afford them."

"A school and street costume should never be conspicuous."

"French heels are not suitable except with party dresses."

"Thin georgette waists are of no utility except to show off a camisole."

"Evening dresses for school girls should not be excessively low in the neck."

"Half socks should not be worn."

"High shoes or oxfords with low heels should be worn to school."

The style shows were arranged, the girls announced, to prove groundless frequent charges that the girls are often immodestly clothed. Live models showed to the parents of the girls what girls considered in good taste and what clothing was taboo.

"We school girls show greater conservatism in our clothing than do our elders," said one girl speaker at the show. "We are strongly against extremes in garbs that women's clubs, legislators, mothers' organizations and others accuse us of donning."

Prizes are offered by the Lane County W. C. T. The object of the contest is to promote a higher standard of morality and to create a public sentiment in favor of respect for law. The subjects as announced are as follows:

- For sixth grade and under:
 1. Health Habits.
 2. Habits that Injure Health.
 3. Why Has Oregon Made a Law Forbidding the Use of Cigarettes by Boys Under Twenty-one?

Local prize \$1; county prize \$2; state prize \$5; national \$10.

Length of essays from 200 to 600 words.

Essays will be graded three-fourths upon subject matter and one-fourth upon grammatical correctness and appearance.

The best essay only in each of the classifications in each school may be entered in the contest by sending by May 10 to the county superintendent of scientific temperance instruction, Mrs. Mary Russell, 372 Twelfth avenue west, Eugene.
