HIGH SCHOOL NOTES

The Oregon Agriculture college offers four cash scholarship gifts of \$100 each to be awarded to the four high school seniors ranking highest in a competitive contest between the high schools of the state. The contestants are to write a paper on the question, "What, in order of their importance, are the three improvements most desirable under present circumstances in the town or city in which I live." The members of the senior class handed in their papers last Tuesday in connection with their English work. The papers are to be graded on a basis of the general desirability and practicability of the three suggestions by three judges chosen by Superintendent Bennett.

The local nine defeated Junction City in a baseball game last Saturday by a score of 9 to 1. The game was well played, with the locals in the lead from the third inning until the last inning. This makes the second straight victory for C. G. H. S.

A special meeting of the Mystic Dagger was held Monday evening for the purpose of selecting the club pin. A dagger with the word "Mystic" engraved upon it was selected. This design was an original idea of a member of the club.

Superintendent H. Omer Bennett gave an interesting address to the students of the high school Tuesday morning on the written and unwritten laws of the school. He made clear the difference between privileges and obligations. He also made clear that the abuse of any privilege brings about the removal of that privilege as well as punishment. He spoke of the need of combined effort of all students to the very close of school and said that the question of some students making passing grades depends upon their work from now to the close of school.

Oliver W. Stewart, who was in the city to give a lecture, gave an interesting talk before the high school Thursday morning, May 5. His talk was a part of his lecture, "Nations, Present Day and Age." He told of the great faith which all nations have in the American people. He urged the students to realize their responsibility in helping to keep the faith. He stressed the fact that the ruling generation must soon give up its power to those who are now in school; and for that reason the students in school must more seriously consider their duties. Mr. Stewart ended his speech by quoting the ancient pladator, "We who are about to die salute you."

The 78th anniversary and 21st celebration of Founders' day at Champeog was held Saturday under the auspices of the Oregon Pioneer association and the Oregon Historical society.

The Branch Line club of Enterprise recently purchased a 120 acre tract of land at the head of Wallowa lake to be used as a camping ground for local and visiting members of the Elks lodge.

A suit to test the constitutionality of the law which prohibits the catching of salmon and other food fish by trolling off the coast of Oregon in May and June was filed in the circuit court at Astoria.

A deal has been closed whereby the Great Northern Steamship company sold to the Spokane, Portland & Seattle Railway company the steamship terminals at Flavel for a consideration of \$162,000.

Governor Olcott has announced that he would appoint Frank S. Word of Portland as a member of the state board of pharmacy to succeed Clyde G. Huntley of Oregon City, when the latter's term expires May 20.

Plans are now under way for another big hotel to be constructed on the Columbia river highway near Dodson, about 35 miles east of Portland. Efforts are also to be made to open a tract of about 600 acres as a homestead.
