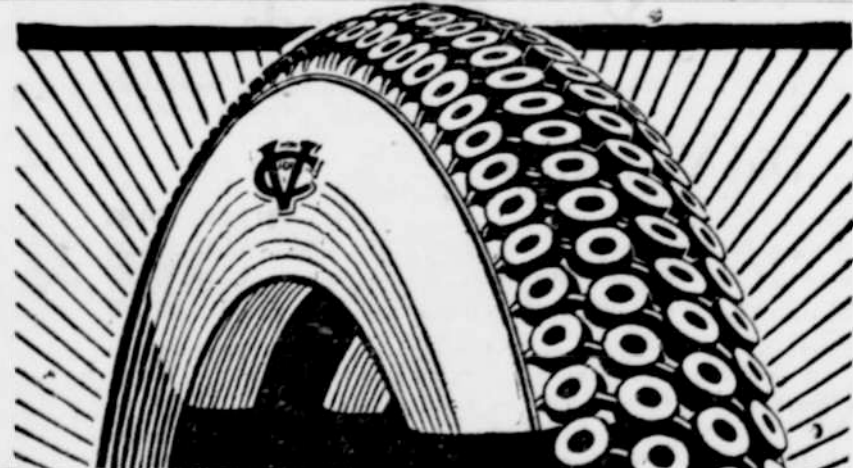

The Story of Our States

XVII.—OHIO



THE Northwest Territory, of which Ohio is a part, was a bone of contention between Spain, France and England. Spain's claim was based on the voyage of De Soto up the Mississippi river. France, through the explorations of La Salle from the north and the early entry of French priests from Canada, considered this territory theirs. As for England, she rested her claims on the discovery of North America by the Cabots, and in the charter granted to Virginia included all the country lying to the West.

The French were the first to get a foothold in Ohio, but the English pioneers, who shortly began to drift westward, firmly established their settlements in the fertile Ohio valley. After a long period of warfare, in which the Indians played a leading part, the Northwest Territory was finally ceded to the United States by the Treaty of Independence in 1783. And Virginia and other states, which had laid claim to portions of this region turned over their rights to the federal government.

The government of the Northwest Territory was formally created by the ordinance of 1787. People from the East migrated into this territory in such numbers that by 1803 Ohio was taken into the Union as the seventeenth state. The fourth largest state in size of population, Ohio has 24 electoral votes for President, while in area, with its 41,040 square miles, it ranks only thirty-fifth, which shows how densely it is populated. It is noted as the state of Presidents. President Harding makes the seventh Ohioan to fill the presidential office.

The name Ohio is derived from the Iroquois word O-hee-yo, meaning "beautiful river." It was first applied by the Indians of the Five Nations to what we now call the Allegheny river, one of the chief tributaries of the Ohio. Gradually the name came to include the whole river, sometimes even being applied to the Mississippi. Later it was confined to the river between Pittsburgh and Cairo, and appropriately the first state formed on its northern bank was named after it. Ohio is often called the Buckeye State from its large number of horse-chestnut trees.

OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Principal Events of the Week
Briefly Sketched for Information of Our Readers.

A. E. Bradley, near Aumsville, has 110 acres in flax.

The 1921 wheat crop in Marion county will be the largest for many years. The state game farm near Eugene expects to produce 5000 Chinese pheasants this year.

A late census report shows that Lane county has 3279 farms, an increase of 483 in the last 10 years.

Delegates from Modern Woodmen camps all over Oregon held their state convention in Bend last week.

The Brownsville city council has let a \$67,438 contract to a Portland concern for street paving this summer.

E. H. Castle has been appointed superintendent of schools for Polk county to succeed R. E. Cannon, resigned.

The biggest class in the history of Salem high school will be graduated June 17, when 167 will receive diplomas.

A \$10,000 concrete block will be erected at Harrisburg this spring to house the postoffice and two merchandise stores.

Jackson county has appropriated \$10,000 from the sale of bonds to be used in improving the Dead Indian road near Ashland.

The free employment bureau of the Hood River labor union has placed 71 men and 11 women in positions in the last six weeks.

Coal in what supposed to be in paying quantities has been discovered on the Joseph Hartley farm in Eagle valley, Baker county.

Wheat fields in the Athena section are showing a considerable amount of tarweed and it is feared the yield will be seriously affected.

Old wooden buildings are being moved in Bend in preparation for excavation for the new \$40,000 office building to be erected there.

Up to date, farm loans aggregating \$415,000 have been made by Baker county farmers and there are applications on file for \$200,000 more.

Proposals will be invited within two weeks for construction of a new bridge across the Willamette river connecting Oregon City and West Linn.

Paving work on the Pacific highway between Goshen and Walker, nearly 10 miles, will begin June 1. Between 50 and 75 men will be employed.

Blasting in front of the old Bend Methodist church last Sunday partially wrecked the building just after the first services were held there.

W. C. McAllister, 29, died in a Baker hospital, after being injured in a blast near Telocaset, which blew rocks into his body and cut off one of his arms.

Linn county public schools have been apportioned \$38,870 school funds. This is on a basis of \$5 per capita for the children in the various districts.

The Umpqua Baptist association convention was held at Roseburg with delegates from all sections of the southern part of the state in attendance.

A monster parade on the streets of Eugene will be the big feature of the first day's session of the Oregon State grange, which meets there May 31 to June 2.

Eighty men and 14 planes will arrive May 20 and will be stationed at Eugene, which will be termed headquarters for the Ninety-first aero squadron.

To take up outstanding warrants and provide an operating fund, a bond issue of \$75,000 will be voted on by the land holders under the Ochoco project at an early date.

From the Sumpter section comes the report that placer miners are enjoying the best water season in a number of years. Prospects are good for an excellent clean-up.

Mrs. Helen Volgamore of Comstock is in a Eugene hospital with her right breast torn open by the accidental discharge of a gun that she was taking down from the wall.

Petitions are being circulated in Lincoln county requesting the calling of a special election for the purpose of voting on a bond issue for \$343,240 to construct permanent roads.

The women's auxiliaries to the American Legion of this state will hold their first annual convention in Eugene July 1 and 2 during the state convention of the legion.

Indications of the presence of oil and gas in the Echo region have caused J. E. Leonard of Spokane to lease 30,000 acres of land on the south side of the Umatilla river, west of that town.

Edward M. Cousin, acting for Linn, Lane, Lincoln and Benton counties, has filed with the state public service commission a new petition for rehearing in the telephone rate case.

Extension of the tourist service department of the Oregon State Motor association throughout Oregon is being rapidly accomplished, according to A. L. Tetu, president of the organization.

The Story of Our States

III.—NEW JERSEY



NEW JERSEY became the third state just six days after Pennsylvania had formally adopted the Constitution. This territory, which covers 8,224 square miles, originally was a part of the province of New Netherlands. In 1664, after the English conquest of New Netherlands, the duke of York sold the southern portion to Lord Berkeley and Sir George Carteret. The latter had won some distinction as governor of the little island of Jersey in the English channel, and it was in his honor that the new province came to be called New Jersey. The eastern portion, that about Newark, was settled by Carteret and the territory to the southwest, where Burlington and Trenton now stand, fell to Berkeley. After a few years Berkeley sold his share to a party of Quakers and two distinct provinces were formed, called East and West Jersey. They were reunited, however, in 1702, and became a single province under the direct rule of the English crown.
