City Council

June 6.—Council met in regular session. Present: Allison, Durham, Kime, Short, Venich, mayor, city attorney, engineer, recorder, marshal. Minutes of last regular and three adjourned sessions read, corrected and approved. Resignation of David Sterling as councilman from the second ward was accepted. E. L. Mackin was elected to fill the unexpired term, was duly sworn in and took his seat.

Notice was read from public service commission of filing of application for increased rates to private consumers by the Cottage Grove Electric Light Co., same to go into effect July 1, unless suspended and laid on table until next adjourned meeting.

Communication from Oregon Telephone federation asking that city join said federation for more effective cooperation against telephone rate increase. City attorney instructed to sign membership blank and return same, indicating city's concurrence.

Matter of concrete steps placed without permit in newly paved alley back of telephone office and Moderna Pharmacy referred to street committee to report at next meeting.

Mayor announced that Councilman Mackin was appointed member of street and water committees and Councilman Allison to serve as chairman of street committee.

Resignation of Councilman Kime from library board accepted and Councilman Mackin appointed to fill out the unexpired term.

The mayor reported that it was learned from State Librarian Marvin during her recent visit here that under the law anyone employed by the board for pay was ineligible to membership on the library board and he would therefore appoint George A. Proctor a member of the board, vice Miss Hopper, who came under this rule as librarian.

Reports of city treasurer, recorder and marshal for May read and ordered filed.

Matter of repairing Sixth street with bitulithic referred to street committee to take up with the property owners.

Water Superintendent Pitcher instructed to get sample of Juniatta creek water on his next trip to intake to send to state health board.

Resolution adopted asking forestry department to set aside fir exclusive use by the city of the Juniatta creek watershed and copies ordered sent to all Oregon members of congress.

City attorney ordered to collect delinquent street assessments on the T. K. Campbell property on Pacific highway and on lot 3, block 3, McQueen's addition.

In the matter of damage to old Pacific highway within city limits by heavy hauling of Blake-Compton Co. trucks, the city engineer reported that he and Assistant State Highway Engineer Libby had examined into it and recommended that the trucks be confined to a 10 foot track and that Blake-Compton be required to make good as before with hot stuff pavement south to west Main and south of that street intersection with crushed rock.

City attorney instructed to have report at next adjourned meeting on matter of fire proof roof for Mrs. Loucks building on Main street. City attorney reported old building in rear of Hotel Oregon repaired but that roof not cleaned of moss. Attorney ordered to notify owner to have same cleaned and marshal directed to enforce same rule for all roofs.

Drainage at Standard Oil Co.'s plant left with street committee to report at next meeting.

Finance committee instructed to recommend to treasurer how to invest sewer fund.

City engineer directed to have proper intake cement box put in at M street storm sewer for connection with west side school drainage.

City engineer instructed to prepare plans and specifications for sewer district No. 3, and the sewer committee to prepare an estimated apportionment of the cost of same to the property affected.
