Household Hints

Save the baking powder cans. They are splendid for steaming puddings. Holes may be punched in the bottom of a can and it then makes a fine chopper for soft stuffs like potato, onions, etc. A can with holes punched also makes a good sprinkler to be used with a larger dish of water.

A cotton flannel bag made large enough to slip over the broom is excellent for dusting ceilings and walls. It will be advantageous to have draw strings so it may be tied securely to the broom. This is also fine for sweeping matting as it will take up the dust easily and save the matting much wear. A bare broom splinters.

A two-foot fold of cloth covering the top of comforters and blankets makes them much more sanitary, this covering being washed frequently, and then hasted on again.
