City Council

June 13.—Council met in adjourned ession, roll call, present: Councilmen Allison, Durham, Kime, Mackin, Short, Veatch, the mayor, city attorney, recorder, marshal.

By invitation, C. M. Shinn, manager of the Cottage Grove Electric com-pany, explained to the council the necessity for the proposed increase in necessity for the proposed increase in rates to private consumers, stating that the shut down of the saw milithat furnished fuel for the electric plant was the cause as it had more than doubled the fuel cost; that he had investigated price of coal and oil but either was more than cord wood, which was costing at the rate of \$1000 a month. The cost of the mill wood had been \$466 a month. He said the rates would be in effect only during rates would be in effect only during

he mill shut down, Raiph D. Mores, bond buyer of Portland, proposed to council to have bond attorneys direct the steps taken for the issuance of \$15,000 bond refunding the issue of October 1, 1901, furnish the blank bonds, etc., at a cost of \$200, which sum was to be remitted if the bonds were awarded to the house he represented.
