This year's picnic will be held at Eugene in the municipal auto camping ground back of the butte tomorrow, beginning at 10 a. m. A basket luncheon will be served at noon and there will be talks and amusements of various kinds. No set speech will be made but a number of prominent pioneers will be called upon to recite reminiscences of early days in Oregon and Lane County.
