Questions Answered

(Concluded from last week.)
Who is going to run the Cottage Grove Chamber of Commerce?

The members are going to run it. In the modern chamber of commerce, which is what Cottage Grove is going to have at the end of the campaign, every member is on an equal footing. Each pays the same dues, each has one vote only, each has the right to nominate for office, each has as loud a voice as any other in the making of the program of work and each will be called upon to exercise all these rights.

The election of the new directors and officers will take place at once upon the completion of the membership campaign. The election machinery is of the simplest character. Each member will be provided with a ballot bearing the name of every member so arranged that he may vote for whom he chooses. A complete printed list of the membership will be a part of the ballot. The men elected to the board of directors will be the ones receiving the largest number of votes, cast secretly and uninfluenced by any other consideration than merit.

This is democracy reduced to its simplest form. Fitness in the opinion of his fellow citizens will alone determine whether a member shall hold office. Ability and a willingness to serve his community will alone keep a man in office once he has been elected to it, for it is apparent that any director who fails to measure up to the expectations of his fellow members will not be re-elected.

How the committees will be chosen has been explained. Under the modern plan the member's forum will be an important feature of the expanded Cottage Grove chamber of commerce. It will be the medium of communication between the officers and directors and the membership. It will frequently hold lunches and meetings, bringing together the membership to invite the presentation and discussion of new projects. It will check up on the progress of work of committees. It will bring speakers on important subjects to the chamber to assist the community in the solution of its problems. It will be the dynamo which will give motion and action to the chamber as an organization.

The whole purpose of the chamber of commerce, first and last, is to bring together the most responsible and capable men and women in the city and keep them at work for the good of the city.

How will the Cottage Grove Chamber of Commerce be financed?

By membership dues of \$20 a year, pledged for three years. This is the method which has been adopted and is being followed by all of the successful chambers of commerce in America. It is the method which has come out of years of experiments and experience. It has not yet been abandoned or modified by any chamber of commerce which has tested it and no single instance of failure has been charged against it.

An often tried and now discarded plan was that of uniform dues of \$5 or \$10, fixed at this low rate on the theory that more members would join. In Olean, N. Y., with dues of \$1 a year, the chamber of commerce was able to secure about 100 members. The dues were raised to \$20 and within six months the membership had increased to more than 600 interested, active men and women and in a year they have done some things the city had been waiting to do for 10 years.

If the Cottage Grove Chamber of Commerce is to do the things the citizens want done, it must have an adequate income.

Two hundred fifty memberships at \$20 each will provide the best amount it should have for rent, light, heat, printing, stationery, expenses of committees, clerical and stenographic help and the salaries of its secretary, its only paid official.

In addition to the membership dues, business concerns and individuals will be asked to invest in a service fund, to make a total budget annually of \$10,000, this money to be a community chest for all public activities. This saves the expense of the hat and only a few carrying the load as in the past.

What about the permanence of the Cottage Grove Chamber of Commerce?

In the minds of those who have explained the plans of the expansion campaign, there is of course no such question, but others have and will ask it.

A chamber of commerce is an organization whose life depends upon the activity and cooperation of its membership. A board of directors does not constitute a chamber of commerce. A board of directors without the support of the membership is impotent. Consequently the plan of organization of a chamber of commerce which looks forward to permanency and constantly increasing strength must deal first, last and all the time with the membership.

One of the team captains remarked the other day, after a careful discussion of the expansion plans, that the program adopted is in many respects a reverse of that which has been followed heretofore in some places.

The new members who will come in large numbers to the chamber of commerce will be eager and insistent that the chamber do something. It has been the practice in some chamber of commerce campaigns, after the members have enlisted, to promptly forget them. After this campaign, no day will elapse before the call will go out for the members to elect the directors. As soon as this is done and the officers have been chosen, the members will again be called upon to answer the question: "What is the Chamber of Commerce going to do?"

When each member of the chamber has made his or her answer to this question, the membership as a whole will have given the directors a well-defined program to which they are pledged.

The next question before the membership is, who will carry this program through? Again the answer must come from the membership. The board of directors is a directing body and the membership is a working body. Out of the program of work will come carefully defined specific tasks for the committees to do. There will be no standing committees and no waiting committees. Each assignment that is given to a committee will be explicit in directing what is to be done and when and it is the business of the manager of the chamber of commerce and of the president and of the board of directors to see that the committees keep steadily on their jobs.

The only way to insure the permanence of a voluntary organization of men is to keep them busy and interested. The ways and means that have been discovered to make effective the voluntary service of a large group of citizens are the result of long study and experience. They have within the last four years been given something
