GOMPERS IS AGAIN ELECTED BY LABOR

First Serious Opposition Since 1894 Defeated By Vote of 2 to 1.

Denver, Colo. — President Samuel Gompers, America's veteran labor leader—overwhelmingly defeating his first serious opposition since 1894—Saturday was returned to office with his entire administration for another year by the American Federation of Labor.

The labor chief's forces made a clean sweep from the beginning, when President Gompers was returned to the presidency for the 40th time by overwhelmingly defeating John L. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers, by a vote of 25,922 to 13,324.

The vote was taken amid scenes of wild enthusiasm, rivaling those of national political conventions. The galleries were packed with spectators. The convention floor was overflowing with delegates and their friends. Cheers and applause swept the auditorium at every vote.

This was the first time that Gompers had been seriously opposed since 1894, when he was defeated by John Mc Bride, a mineworker, but was returned to office the following year.

When his victory was announced the labor leader, who is now 71 years old, could scarcely control his emotions.

The election of Gompers brought to a close one of the hottest political campaigns ever waged in the history of organized labor.

Cincinnati, O., was selected for the site of the next convention.

CONFERENCE ON BUDGET IS HELD

Washington, D. C.—Plans for the establishment of the new federal budget system, operative Friday, took tangible form when Charles G. Dawes, director of the budget, at the request of the president called a conference for Wednesday of all cabinet members and other executive administrative officials at which President Harding presided.

The president directed Mr. Dawes to draft a tentative form for the new budget within the next 30 days with estimates of the absolute minimum of government funds needed for the fiscal year beginning July 1.

A White House statement called attention to the necessity for economy in governmental expenditures and said that the tentative form of the budget should point the way, "as would be done in any ordinary business."

BEER FOR SICK IS BANNED

Senate is Expected to Act Before End of Week.

Washington, D. C.—By a vote of 250 to 93, the house passed the Willis-Campbell bill to prevent the sale of beer to the sick and sent it to the senate with expectations of its final enactment before the end of the week.

The vote, which was 21 more than the necessary two-thirds, was taken after four hours of stormy debate.

Briefly the bill would prevent use of beer by the sick on a physician's prescription; would prohibit manufacture and importation of liquor until the present stock held under government supervision for non-beverage use has been exhausted; would limit the number of liquor prescriptions to be issued by physicians to 90 in three months and apply the provisions of the prohibition act to Hawaii and the Virgin Islands.

Lumber Shippers Seek Reparations.

Seattle, Wash.—A fight to force the transcontinental railroads serving the Pacific northwest to return approximately \$3,000,000 to the lumber shippers of Washington and Oregon in the form of reparations for penalty demurrage charges is being prepared by Seattle traffic experts.

Mary Pickford's Divorce Upheld.

Minden, Nev.—District Judge Langan has upheld the divorce of Mary Pickford and Owen Moore, motion picture stars, in March, 1920. The decision is to be appealed to the state supreme court by Attorney-General Fowler.

Woman Heads Baptists.

Des Moines, Ia.—With the election of Mrs. Helen Barrett Montgomery of Rochester, N. Y., as president of the northern Baptist convention, a precedent was set among the larger denominations of the United States.

Sims Again in Harness.

Newport, R. I.—Rear-Admiral Sims has returned to his desk at the naval war college, of which he is president. The matter of his speech in London and the public reprimand from Secretary Denby as a result is closed, he said.
