The most elaborate church wedding held here in many years was that Sunday night at the Christian church, when Miss Blanche Groom became the bride of Mr. Jesse J. Jackson and Miss Lillie Knight became the bride of Mr. Marvell R. Randall. About 100 guests of the first named couple and about 60 of the second named were present.

The ceremony commenced at 9 o'clock with two vocal solos, "O Promise Me," by Mrs. M. A. Horn and "Those Endearing Young Charms" by Mrs. Leon DesLarzes. The wedding procession was headed by Delight Valley school children (former pupils of Miss Groom) carrying flowers and singing "The Bridal Chorus." Flower girls were Beulah Hanna, Ermine Violette, Ruth Bede, Merle Scott, Florence McFarland and little Alice DesLarzes. Little Zelma Bosserman, niece of Miss Groom, carried the ring in a large white lily. Little Nola Dick carried the ring for Miss Knight, also in a large white lily. The brides-to-be entered from the left and the grooms-to-be from the right. Miss Groom was supported by Miss Eleanor Nixon, a former pupil, Miss Knight by Miss Flossie Mathis and Mr. Jackson by Reginald Haight, former pupil of his bride. The Lohengrin wedding march was played by Miss Hazel Loucks and Miss Lucile Davidson. The impressive ring ceremony was performed by Rev. J. E. Carlson, pastor of the church. Both brides were gowned in white satin and georgette, wore bridal veils with orange blossoms and carried bouquets of pink roses.

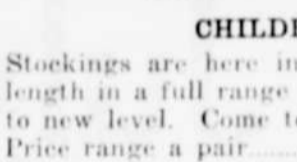

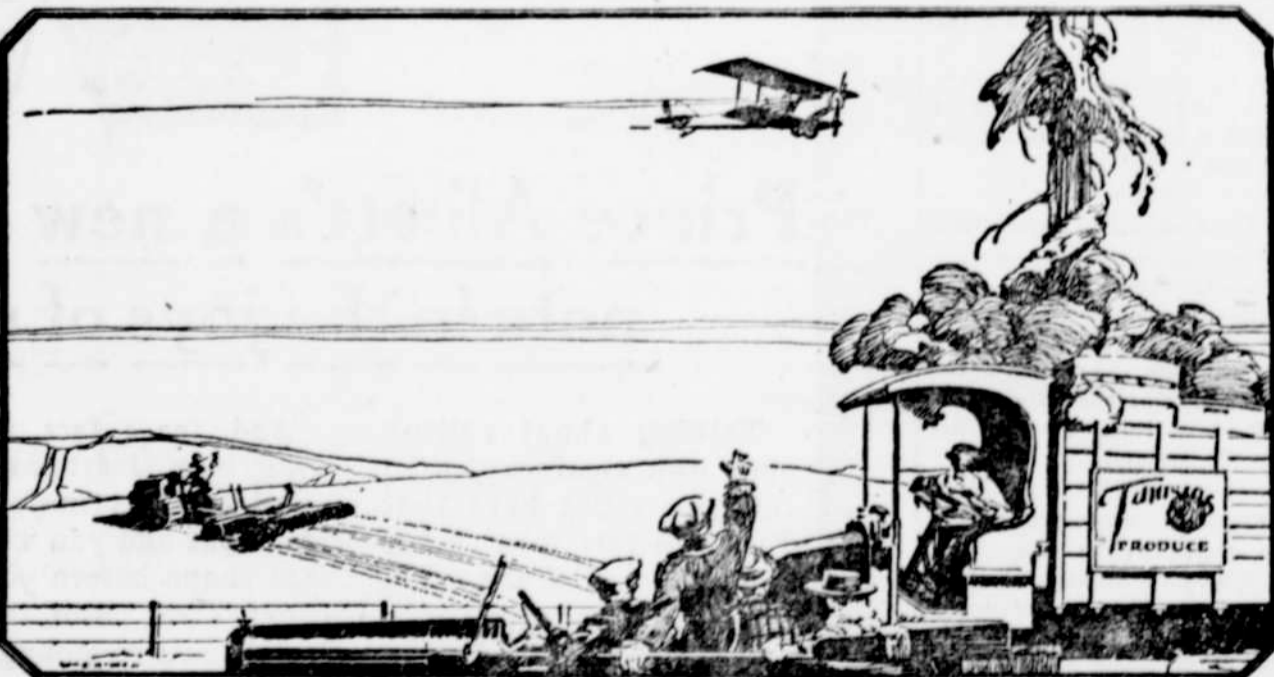
