Tested Recipes

Coffee Caramel Custard.
Put one-half cupful of sugar in a saucepan. Keep stirring over a low fire until the sugar melts into a light, caramel-like mixture. Be very careful to avoid scorching. Heat one cupful of strong coffee and one cupful of milk. Add this to the sugar and put in saucepan over hot water until the sugar is dissolved. Beat two eggs a little. Add them with a couple of grains of salt. Strain, put into cups. Bake in a slow oven until firm and brown on top.

Boiled Salad Dressing.
Using a double boiler as your utensil, blend together two tablespoons of butter and one tablespoon of flour. Then stir in a cupful of milk or water and two beaten yolks of eggs. Stir constantly until all is smooth and thick. Take the boiler from the fire. Add a teaspoon of mustard, one of sugar, a pinch of salt and one-eighth teaspoonful of cayenne pepper and one-fourth cupful of vinegar or lemon juice. Beat thoroughly and if you wish the dressing richer add one-half cupful of cream.

Soak muslin bags in a solution of one-half pound of alum to a gallon of boiling water, letting them remain until the water gets cold. Hang them up and when they have dripped dry they are ready for use.
