#### Coffee Caramel Custard.

Put one-half cupful of sugar in a 610.89 saucepan. Keep stirring over a low fire until the sugar melts into a light, 625.00 caramel-like mixture. Be very carefut to avoid scorehing. Heat one cupful \$760,447.79 of strong coffee and one cupful of milk. Add this to the sugar and put in saucepan over hot water until the sugar is dissolved. Beat two eggs \$ 25,000.00 little. Add them with a couple of grains of salt. Strain, put into cups. Bake in a slow oven until firm and

#### Boiled Salad Dressing.

Using a double boiler as your utensil, blend together two tablespoons 34,764.53 of butter and one tablespoon of flour. 47,615.68 Then stir in a cupful of milk or water and two beaten yolks of eggs. Stirconstantly until all is smooth and thick. Take the boiler from the fire. 153,504.09 Add a teaspoon of mustard, one of 600.02 sugar, a pinch of salt and one eighth teaspoonful of cayenne pepper and one-fourth cupful of vinegar or lemon Beat thoroughly and if you wish the dressing richer add one half cupful of cream.
