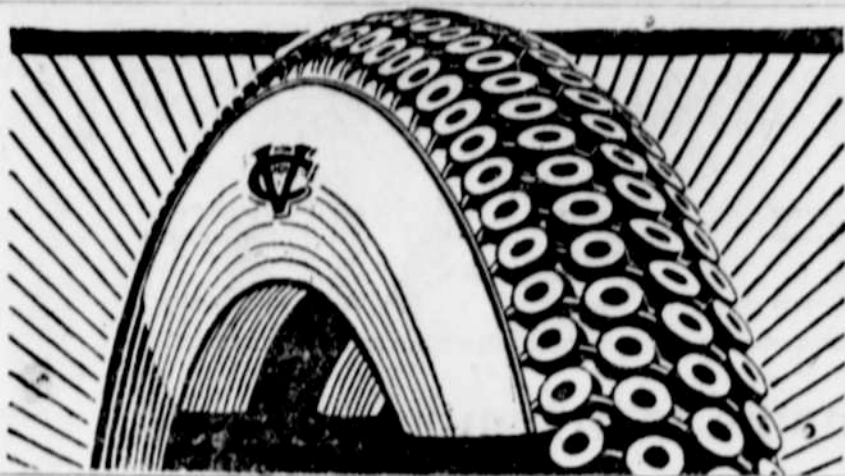

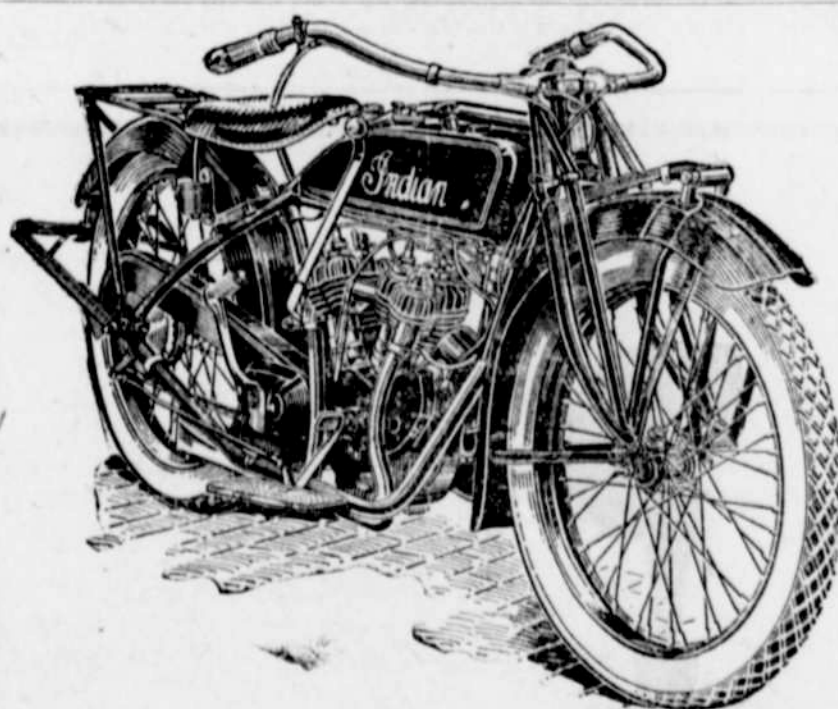

HEADLESS BODY IS FOUND IN WRECK

Roseburg, Or.—Dr. R. M. Brumfield, prominent dentist and lodge man of this city, is charged with the murder of Dennis Russell, a laborer. The finding of a charred and decapitated body under the wreckage of a flaming automobile on the Pacific highway near Dillard led Sheriff Stanner to issue a warrant for the arrest of Dr. R. M. Brumfield, on a charge of murder.

According to the sheriff, the victim was Dennis Russell, who lived alone in a shack near Dillard. Brumfield was known to carry a total of \$27,000 insurance.

Alleged evidence is said to give strong indications that Russell was murdered and the body mutilated and placed in a carefully planned auto wreck to make it possible for the family of the heavily indebted dentist to collect his insurance money, which amounted to \$27,000, it being believed, evidently, by the doctor that the body would, in its badly disfigured condition, be mistaken for his own, officers declared.

The headless and charred body in the morgue was identified as that of Dennis Russell by two brothers, J. T. Russell of Boomer Hill and Ed Russell of Dillard. Mrs. Brumfield maintained that the body was that of her husband.

The coroner's jury returned the following verdict Wednesday, following a two days' hearing of the evidence in the case:

"We find the deceased is named W. Dennis Russell, is a native of Douglas county, Oregon, aged about 44 years, and that he came to his death on July 13, 1921, at a point on the Pacific highway about one-half mile south of his residence near Dole in Douglas county, Oregon, by gunshot wounds, inflicted by an unknown person."

School Law Is Fuzzier.

Population in some of Lane county's school districts must be increased if a new school law is to be obeyed, says County School Superintendent E. J. Moore. Mr. Moore finds that the law requires two qualified voters and freeholders for every director in each district to be appointed to serve as a school district budget committee. In several Lane county districts, says the superintendent, the total number of voting freeholders is less than twice the number of directors.

The effect of the law is to provide a budget committee of six, besides the three directors, in rural districts. In Eugene the number will be 10 in addition to the five members of the board. Some districts do not include six freeholding voters, says the superintendent.

The county superintendent is in receipt of a supply of the new budget forms which must be filled out before a school district budget can be adopted. The blanks are now being mailed. Mr. Moore says that districts must call special elections to vote their budget according to the new form at some time between now and January 1, 1922.
