C. E. Nichols, of Medford, arrived Wednesday for a visit with his cousin, W. Wither, at Segrinus.

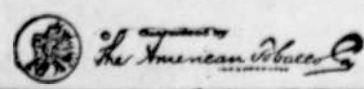
