Lorane to Eugene is being used at present as a detour while Pacific highway is under repair.

"Between Walker and Cottage Grove the pavement has been finished except from the bridge north of Cottage Grove to Saguinaw. On the Warren job, from Divide to Drain, there are two plants at work, one at Comstock and the other at Drain. The Comstock plant has finished two miles of paving from Divide south, and the Drain plant has completed the work between Anlauf and Rock creek bridge, north of Leona, also a stretch from Drain south to the 'Y' spur of the Southern Pacific railway.

"On the Goshen-Walker job pavement is being laid to a point a half mile south of Creswell. This is concrete pavement. The best showing of all is on the Monroe-Junction City section, where 7 miles of pavement has been completed on an \$86 mile contract. The work will be finished by August 1. Good work is being done on the concrete pavements on the Corvallis south section and the Salem south job."

Drumfish Chowder.

Two cups Drumfish pickings, four cups dried white potatoes, one cup onions, one-fourth cup salt pork, one cup breadcrumbs, two cups rice stock or milk, four tablespoons flour, one tablespoon salt, one-eighth teaspoon pepper, two tablespoons parsley. Pick the fish into small pieces; add it to the potatoes and onions, which have been boiled until tender in a little water. Fry the salt pork slowly until light brown; add the flour to the salt pork and stir until smooth, then add the potatoes and the fish. Add the rice stock and the seasoning. Just before serving add the bread crumbs and the parsley. This makes a very hearty supper dish.
