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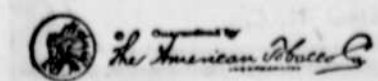
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OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Principal Events of the Week Briefly Sketched for Information of Our Readers.

The Lincoln county fair will be held at Toledo, September 8-10, inclusive.

Medford policemen are waging a campaign against automobile mashers.

The Marion county flax crop will aggregate 800 tons, according to estimates made by growers.

Douglas county, through its county court, has just appropriated money to employ a public health nurse.

Wolves and cougars have been causing severe losses to stockmen grazing cattle on the Umpqua forest ranges.

Medford Chamber of Commerce officials are considering the possibility of establishing a municipal playground for children.

What is declared a good grade of coking coal, eight and one-half feet deep, was struck at the Munday oil well near Medford.

The quarterly meeting of the North Pacific Coast Association of Railway Special Agents and Police will be held in Portland September 17.

More than 2,000,000 pounds of loganberries were handled this season by the Kings Food Products company, with headquarters in Salem.

Six small forest fires were started in the Santiam national forest this week as the result of an electrical storm which swept the forest.

Salem cannerymen announce that the dried-fruit market has reached its lowest ebb and that better prices may be expected in the near future.

It is estimated that from 750 to 775 car loads of pears will be shipped out from the Rogue river valley this season, and about 800 cars of apples.

The catch of salmon by the purse seines operating outside and the gill netters drifting close to the mouth of the Columbia river continues good.

Members of the public service commission have set August 22 as the date for hearing the application for overhead railroad crossings near Brookings.

The Disabled Veterans Auxiliary is the name of a new corporation organized in Portland, according to articles filed in the state corporation department.

Harvest is under full head in Morrow county and wheat is making a fine yield in all sections. Better than 40 bushels were reported from many farms.

The rim road around Crater lake is open to travel, the last big cut through the deep snow still on the wonderful scenic road having been made.

Medford citizens interested in mining have formed a club for the purpose of stimulating mining activity in southern Oregon and northern California.

More than 1,500,000 pumpkin pies will be made next fall and winter from dehydrated pumpkins, to be put up this season by the Kings Products company of Salem.

Although 70 fires have occurred in the Deschutes national forest this year, so efficiently has protection work been organized that only 158 acres have been burned.

At the special recall election affecting the Umpqua board of port commissioners, J. L. Brown and Joseph R. Butler were retained in office by an overwhelming majority.

Fire of unknown origin swept over 200 acres of stubble on the Watts Brothers' ranch at Athena, destroying more than 1000 sacks of wheat, valued at approximately \$2000.

A dozen or more applicants have been received by the regents of the Oregon state normal school for appointment to succeed J. H. Ackerman, late president of the institution.

Work on the highways in Tillamook county is now nearing completion, with the exception of the bridge and the new road near Hebo, which will take two months more to complete.

The salmon pack this season will be about 75 per cent of that of last year, according to Carl D. Shoemaker, master fish warden. He estimated this year's pack at about 340,000 cases.

Cherry growers of Cove in Union county have shipped 18 carloads of black cherries and 11 carloads of Royal Annes and have already received over \$40,000 in payment for their crops.

Increases in the initial bond issue from \$3,000,000 to \$5,000,000 to make the first payments of the soldiers' loan and bonus voted by the people was decided upon by the state bonus commission.

The internal disturbances on the south side of Mount Hood have created no small interest at Hood River. While Hood River folks at first were prone to scout the stories, old-time mountaineers say they believe the eruption was caused as the result of an accumulation of melted snow and ice water coming in contact with the hot depths of the old crater.

Umatilla county farmers have raised over 300 acres of sunflowers this year for silage. The tonnage from an acre of sunflowers is double that from an acre of corn, while the food value is the same.

N. J. Fullerton was killed and Roscoe Foster seriously injured when a boulder rolled on them while they were doing assessment on their mining claim on Hurricane creek, 15 miles from Joseph.

Twenty-four Baker business men made a junketing trip in automobiles through Grant county. The purpose of the trip was to develop closer relations between Baker and Grant county merchants.

Professor M. E. Peck, instructor of biology at Willamette university, has returned to Salem from eastern Oregon, where he assembled a collection of approximately 2500 different species of grasses.

A joint meeting of residents of the Lone Wolf section, near North Powder, Baker county, met last week to organize a company to begin a new creamery, with plant and headquarters at North Powder.

A mass meeting of fishermen was held at Astoria recently to discuss the menace of purse seining. The gillnetters are planning to refuse to deliver any fish to a cannery that buys from the purse seiners.

Salem cannerymen have offered as much as \$70 a ton for stringless beans, as against \$60 a ton paid two years ago, when war prices were at their peak. One concern expects to process approximately 400,000 pounds of this product.

Thirty-five small fires have been started recently in the forest near Rogue river by persons who desire to have the brush cleaned out. This is an annual occurrence in that locality and the forest service is busy seeking evidence to arrest the culprits.

Checks have been mailed to all creditors who filed claims in connection with the failure of the Yoncalla State bank, according to announcement made by Frank Bramwell, state superintendent of banks. This is the final dividend and represents 7 per cent.

There is no apparent reason for alarm in Oregon as the result of the activities of the Ku Klux Klan, according to a letter prepared by Governor Olcott following receipt of a protest against revival of the organization in this state from J. E. Forbes, a resident of Springfield.

Premiums received by insurance corporations operating in Oregon for the year ended December 31, 1920, aggregated \$24,678,018.29, while losses and claims paid during the same period totaled \$9,183,644.33, according to a report completed by A. C. Barber, state insurance commissioner.

The Oregon apple crop this year is estimated at 5139 cars, as against 3250 cars in 1920 and 5379 cars in 1919. The pear crop is estimated at 8000 tons and the prune crop at 21,510,000 pounds dried. These estimates are made by F. L. Kent of the bureau of crop estimates, department of agriculture.

Members of the building committee of the Salem lodge of Elks are gathering information with relation to other lodge homes in Oregon preparatory to approving final plans for the new structure to be erected by the order in Salem. The structure when completed will cost approximately \$150,000.

There were two fatalities in Oregon due to industrial accidents during the week ending August 11, according to a report prepared by the state industrial accident commission. The victims were Raymond S. Fox, lineman, Tillamook, and Kenneth Wilkinson, logger, Vernonia. There were 461 accidents during the week covered in the report.

The harvest of winter wheat and oats continues, according to the weekly bulletin of the weather bureau, and harvest of spring grain is well advanced except in elevated districts, while considerable threshing has been done. Hot, dry weather has caused material injury to late spring grain in most parts of the state. Irrigated corn is growing well under the influence of the warm weather, but unirrigated corn is in serious need of rain.

Governor Olcott has named five delegates to represent the state of Oregon at the press congress of the world to be held in Honolulu, Hawaii, October 4 to 14. The delegates are: W. J. Hofmann, the Oregonian, Portland; C. E. Ingalls, editor Corvallis Gazette-Times, Corvallis; E. E. Brodie, publisher of the Oregon City Enterprise, Oregon City; S. C. Morton, editor St. Helens Mist, St. Helens, and L. R. Wheeler, editor Portland Telegram, Portland.

Representative Sinnott has announced that examinations will be held October 29 at Baker, Bend, Klamath Falls, La Grande, Ontario, Pendleton and The Dalles, at which eligibles may qualify for appointments to the United States military academy at West Point and the United States naval academy at Annapolis. Three principal midshipmen, with three alternates, each, are to be named to Annapolis, and one principal cadet, with two alternates, to West Point.

ORDER.

In the matter of the application of Pete Mostachetti for the viewing out and location of a gateway.

The above named Pete Mostachetti, having duly made and filed his petition in said court praying for the location and viewing out of a gateway from the home and farm premises of said petitioner to the most available public road provided by law, and it appearing to the court that the farm or residence of said petitioner is not reached conveniently by any public road provided by law, and that it is necessary that the public and said petitioner shall have ingress to and egress from the farm or residence of said petitioner and the court having duly made its order appointing a board of county viewers, and having duly made its order directing such board of county viewers to meet at a certain therein specified town: on August 23, 1921, at 10 o'clock a. m. at the buildings of petitioner in section 18, township 21, S. range 3 west, W. M., Lane County, Oregon, such time being not less than ten days from the making of such order, and it further appearing from said petition that the following persons and corporations own the land across which said gateway is intended to be established, now, therefore, it is hereby ordered that James H. Hawley, whose residence is in Divide, in Lane County, Oregon, and his address the same, The Oregon & California Railroad company, a corporation, whose postoffice address is at Portland, Oregon, and wherein said corporation maintains a residence and office, and the Southern Pacific Company, a corporation, which maintains an office and has a place of business residence in Lane County, Oregon, and which latter corporation leases and presently occupies the railway and right of way belonging to said Oregon & California Railroad Company, across which such gateway will go, be and they and each thereof are hereby notified that such board of county viewers so appointed as above set forth will meet at the buildings of petitioner on section 18, township 21, south range 3 west W. M., Lane County, Oregon on the 23rd day of August, 1921, at the hour of 10 o'clock a. m. for the purpose of viewing out and locating either a suitable road not exceeding sixty feet wide, or a gateway not less than ten nor more than thirty feet wide, or both, as may be found best by said road viewers, having regard to all surrounding circumstances and conditions of the case, from the farm or residence of said petitioner to the nearest point practicable on a public road and to assess the damage to be sustained thereby.

It is ordered further that four weeks notice must be given to said Oregon & California Railroad Company, a corporation, by publication of the same in The Cottage Grove Sentinel, a newspaper printed and published in said Lane County, Oregon.
