### Tested Recipes

**American Chop Suey.**  
Caramelize one tablespoon of sugar, add 1 1/2 cups of dried cooked pork or veal, six finely-chopped onions, two cups chopped peppers, one tablespoon cooking oil, two cups meat broth and salt to taste. Cook gently until the vegetables are tender. Add 1 cup of cooked rice and 1/2 cup of soy sauce.

**Spiced Cookies.**  
One-fourth cup butter, 1/4 cup hard, creamed together; 1/2 cup brown sugar, 1/2 cup white sugar, 1/4 cup sour milk, 1 egg, 1/2 teaspoon soda, 2 cups flour, 1/4 teaspoon each clove and nutmeg, 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/2 teaspoon lemon extract, 1/2 cup raisins, 1/2 cup chopped nuts. Drop on buttered tins and bake in quick oven.

**Luncheon Spinach.**  
Season 1 cup cooked spinach with 1/4 teaspoon salt, one-eighth teaspoon pepper and 1/2 tablespoon margarine. Hard-cook two eggs, spread half of spinach in buttered glass baking dish, add a layer of minced ham, 1/2 cup is sufficient; next eggs chopped fine, then thin white sauce and sprinkle one-eighth cup grated cheese on top. Set in hot oven until cheese is rich brown.
