OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Principal Events of the Week Briefly Sketched for Information of Our Readers.

William L. Finley has been re-elected president of the Oregon Audubon society.

The enrollment in the Corvallis city schools is expected to reach 1500, the largest in its history.

For the first time in the history of Grants Pass schools more than 1000 students were matriculated.

At an election in Condon the proposal to bond the city for \$60,000 for a water supply was defeated.

Plans for the erection of a five-story apartment house in Salem at a cost of \$150,000 have been announced.

Attendance at Redmond union high school shows an increase of more than 30 per cent over that of last year.

The state game commission at a recent meeting decided to ask for bids for completion of the Tumalo hatchery.

The Ashland iron works, founded 20 years ago by George W. Dodson, who died of heart failure Friday, will be closed.

Portland ranked third among Pacific coast cities in the volume of building permits issued during the month of August.

A reduction of valuations in farm lands in Deschutes county is being asked by ranchers of the High Desert section.

Negotiations are under way whereby the Woodmen of the World of Salem may come into possession of the Elks' temple.

Approximately 350 forest fires were extinguished by employes of the Douglas county fire patrol during the fire-fighting season.

Fourteen hundred bales of hops have been sold at Eugene since picking started at prices ranging from 25 to 23 cents a pound.

Two-thirds of the big Condon elevator fell filled with 90,000 bushels of wheat. It was estimated that 75 per cent of the grain can be saved.

Aliens, subject to deportation, are pretty well weeded out of the state institutions, according to R. P. Bonham of the United States immigration service.

In a city election held to change several sections of the Fossil city charter, the vote cast was extremely light, 56 voting against and 23 for a change.

The Newberg council has passed an ordinance abolishing all unlimited franchises granted by the city, making it necessary for concerns to apply for new charters.

Raleigh Matthews, 23-year-old farmer, was held responsible, by a coroner's jury at Medford for the death of Wilber (Wig) Jacks at Eagle Point in a shooting affair.

Governor and Mrs. Olcott lost three hours of sleep when they arose before 5 o'clock and escorted their three small sons to the grounds occupied during the day by a circus.

Plans for a federation of southern Oregon chambers of commerce were made at a forum luncheon at Klamath Falls given in honor of the Ashland and Medford delegation.

W. A. Reid of Marshfield has been elected secretary of the Corvallis chamber of commerce. Mr. Reid has served in a like capacity at Marshfield for the past three years.

A co-ed rifle team to represent the Oregon Agricultural college against all-comers is planned by Miss Edna A. Cocks, head of the department of physical education for women.

Marion county will have a rock pile or some other institution for penal labor during the coming winter, if plans now being worked out by members of the county court materialize.

Herbert Egbert of The Dalles won the sweepstakes in the grain division of the northwest hay and grain show in Pendleton with a bushel of hard Federation wheat. Its test weight was 63 pounds.

M. L. (Abe) Evans, confessed slayer of James Doran of McMinnville, entered a plea of not guilty in the circuit court at The Dalles. Judge Fred L. Wilson set his case for Thursday, September 29.

County Agent Jackson has completed his check on the Wasco county apple crop and in a forecast announced that the yield would exceed 275,000 boxes. Of these, 165,000 will come from the Mosier district.

A bond sale of \$150,000 and a tax of about 90 cents an acre are proposed to raise money needed for 1922 by the central Oregon irrigation district, according to a report of the budget committee made public.

The Oregon public service commission honored a warrant for \$1400 and payable to J. P. Newell, rate expert, who appeared on behalf of the commission during the recent rehearing of the case involving the charges of the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company.
