

W. C. T. U. HOLDS SESSION IN EUGENE WEDNESDAY

Cottage Grove Girl Wins First Prize in Grade Essay Contest.

A large number of delegates from Cottage Grove attended a session of the Lane county unit of the Women's Christian Temperance union in Eugene Wednesday. Delegates were also present from Eugene, Springfield and Creswell. Addresses were made by E. F. Carleton, superintendent of Eugene schools, and Mrs. G. L. Buland, state superintendent of the prize essay contests, conducted by the union among the public school pupils of the state.

The following officers were elected for the coming year: President, Mrs. Charissa Gregor, Creswell; vice-president, Mrs. Carrie Day, Eugene; secretary, Mrs. F. J. Abbot, Cottage Grove; treasurer, Miss Elizabeth Thompson, Creswell. Mrs. Alta King, of Eugene, was elected county superintendent of the prize essay contest.

Mrs. Abbot was also selected as a delegate at large to the state convention, which opens in Oregon City October 12.

The first state prize in the health conservation essay contest in the seventh and eighth grades, conducted in May, 1920, was won by Miss Bernice Huntington, of Cottage Grove, who has since moved to Drain. This is a distinguished achievement for Miss Huntington, as there were thousands of competitors. She is invited to be present at the state convention on October 13, which is scientific temperance day, read her essay and receive her reward.

The first prize in the high school contest was won by Miss Annetta Hanson, of Junction City. This makes Lane the gold star county of the state in this work. Miss Hanson's essay is said to be highly regarded by the state judges and is believed to have a very good chance of winning the national first prize.

WOMEN PROMOTE CLUB TO FINANCE PUBLIC REST ROOM HERE

Mrs. W. L. Darby and Mrs. Amelia Phelps are sponsoring a movement for an organization to be known as the Mothers club, the purpose of which is to establish and maintain a public rest room in the city, and a meeting of women of the community has been called by them to discuss ways and means at 2:30 Saturday afternoon in the room formerly occupied by the old Kerr & Sibley grocery and recently vacated by J. N. England.

Tentative plans of the women are to use this room for a rest room, and Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Porter, who own the building, have agreed to lease the room to the club for that purpose for one year, the club to pay only the incidental expenses and taxes.

CRESWELL MAN LOSES LIFE IN COLLISION

John Lindsay Fatally Injured When His Automobile Is Struck by S. P. Freight.

As a result of injuries suffered when he was struck by a Southern Pacific freight train at the Creswell crossing Saturday evening John N. Lindsay, 45, manager of the electric light and power plant at Creswell, died Tuesday night in a Eugene hospital.

He is survived by his wife, two sons, John and George, and four daughters, Mabel, Minnie, Maude and Mary, all of whom reside in Creswell. He was a veteran of the Spanish war and had membership in the Masons and the W. O. W. The funeral will be held at 2 o'clock this afternoon in the Methodist church in Creswell. Rev. J. L. Stratford officiating. The Creswell lodge of Masons will be in charge.

Details of the fatal accident have not been explained as Mr. Lindsay did not recover consciousness long enough to make a connected statement. It is known that his automobile was struck by the pilot of the engine, was hurled a distance of 150 feet and practically demolished, Mr. Lindsay being pinned beneath it. He was alone in the car.

OREGON GUARDSMEN IMPROVE MARKSMANSHIP

Oregon guardsmen finished in 23rd place in the national shoot at Camp Perry, Ohio, competing among 73 guard and service teams from all parts of the United States. The greatest records ever made at a national shoot were turned in at the Camp Perry range. Last year firing over the same course the Oregon team was placed 55th at the national meet, and their showing this year in making 23rd place speaks well for the improvement of the Oregon guardsmen. Only six of the 22 teams that finished ahead of the Oregonians were from national guard companies the others being teams from the regular service.

U. OF O. ENROLLMENT PASSES 2000 MARK

University of Oregon, Eugene, Oct. 2.—An enrollment of 2034 had been reached in the University of Oregon at the close of the fifth day of the fall term, which opened September 20. This includes 150 students in the medical school in Portland, which is a regular department of the university proper. On the Eugene campus alone 1884 students have registered and late entrants are expected to swell the total to 1950.

This indicates an increase of more than 20 per cent over last year's enrollment, according to Carlton E. Spencer, registrar. At a corresponding time last year only 1500 had completed registration and the largest number of students resident on the campus at one time was 1688. There are at least 700 students in the freshman class alone, according to available figures, or 150 more than were in this class last year.

The total enrollment for the year, including the Portland and Eugene summer sessions, extension classes, correspondence work and music specials will be 5457, this figure being based on a careful estimate made by the

registrar. Last year this total was 4276. It is expected that at least 400 more students will register on the campus during the winter and spring terms, bringing the enrollment in regular departments at Eugene up to 2200. This would make a full time campus enrollment, including medical students, of 2350.

Approximately 80 per cent of last year's students, not including those who graduated, have returned to the campus, according to an estimate made by Dean Colin V. Dymont. Uncertain financial conditions caused many to fear that a large number of the old students would not return this fall.

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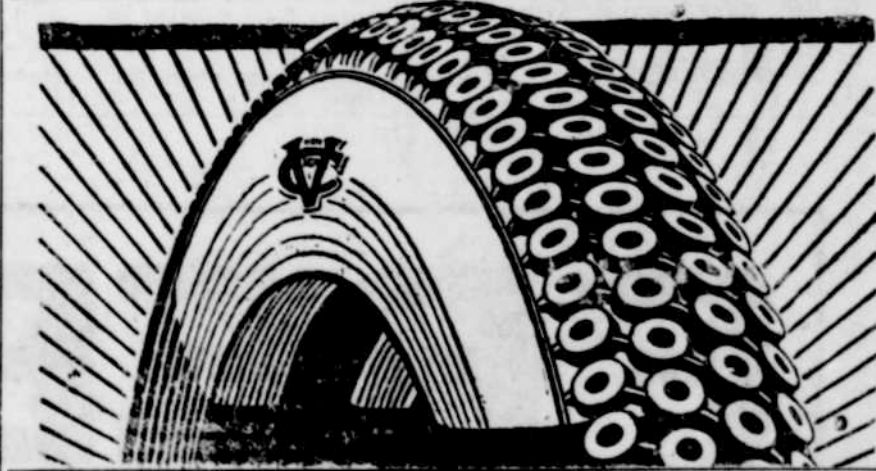


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
