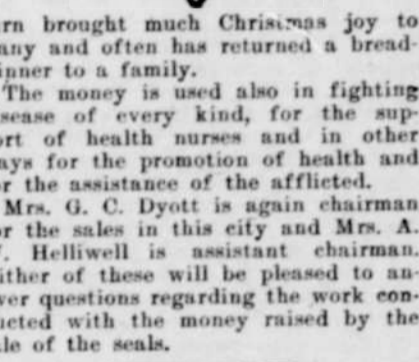

HALF MILLION PUT INTO ROADS DURING PAST YEAR

Road and bridge expenditures in Lane county totaled nearly half a million dollars during the first ten months of the year 1921, according to figures compiled in the office of P. M. Morse, county engineer. These figures will answer for practically the entire year, as very little if any money is expended for roads after November 1. These figures only include the amount expended from county funds derived from taxation, the sale of bonds and the sum received as Lane county's share of the automobile license fund.

In addition to this the state expended large sums in the construction of Pacific highway, McKenzie highway and the Blachly road or Eugene-Florance highway, the county cooperating on the two last named. The amounts expended from the different county funds were as follows:
