EUGENE MAN KILLED IN MOTOR ACCIDENT

Medford, Ore., Dec. 5.—A coroner's jury this afternoon investigating the auto accident early Sunday morning resulting in the death of Fred B. Hartzell, of Eugene, returned a verdict charging that Lloyd Elwood, an auto salesman, of Medford, failed "to use ordinary caution" and that he violated the traffic laws. The prosecuting attorney is expected to call the attention of the grand jury to the case.

Elwood, who is frantic with grief, claimed that he stopped a short distance from the scene of the accident and, hearing no shouts, presumed that he had struck a dog, and came on into Medford. E. B. Gabriel, a salesman, who was with Hartzell at the time, says that he yelled at the car, which refused to stop, and that he hailed a passing car to rush the injured man to the hospital.

Elwood was found at his home Sunday night by the authorities, after an all day search. His two companions in the car substantiate his story.

Mr. Hartzell leaves a widow and two children here.

L. E. Dole Being Sought.

A bench warrant has been issued in the United States court for Lorenzo E. Dole, Lane county homesteader, convicted in Portland during the summer on a charge of setting fires in the government forest.

Dole was sentenced to serve a term in the Multnomah county jail but was allowed to go home and harvest his crops. He promised the court that he would return to Portland when the work was finished and begin his term but it has been more than two months since he did the small amount of labor that was necessary on the farm and he has not yet appeared to serve his sentence.

A. C. Stabling, deputy United States marshal, was recently in the western part of Lane county looking for Dole but returned empty handed. It was learned that he was in Eugene a few days ago on his way to Roseburg.
