Backfield tandems collide at Lincoln

Strength, speed, Jeff Kolberg and Greg Slavens versus speed, strength, Onia Bates and Bob Ewen appear to sum up the scene as the Lincoln Cardinals host the Generals at 8 tonight.

Sizing up to be a battle of backs, tonight's game will be an important one in deciding the Portland Inter-scholastic league flag winner, for the Generals are first and Lincoln is a game behind.

After battling to a 32-32 stand-off at Madison last Friday, the Cards fell to third, but on Saturday, Marshall upset Washington to put Lincoln back into second at 3 wins, 1 loss, 1 tie.

With no back weighing less than 185 lbs., the Cardinals will go with a starting backfield of Slavens and Kolberg at halfbacks, Chuck Rauw at fullback, and John Wiley as the signal-caller.

Twins John Montagna, guard, and Jim Montagna, end, tackle Bob Wilson, and center Joe Recken bolster the line, according to Lincoln Coach Bob Brown.

Kolberg and Slavens, however, have been the bread and butter of the Lincoln attack.

Of the Cardinals' 19 touchdowns, 17 have been tallied by this pair; 9 by Kolberg, who has scored in every game, and 8 by Slavens, who tallied 4 in a single contest.

To counter the Cardinal duo, the Generals will unleash Bates and Ewen, with 16 touchdowns, 9 by Bates, 7 by Ewen.

Both the Generals and Cards have scored well thus far. Coach Wolf's team averages 29.8 points per game,

Rambling 58, 18 and 11 yards to paydirt, Robert Bates paved the way for the Privates' 24-0 shutout against Cleveland. "We weren't really too enthused about the game," said Coach Bill White.
