

Voters face 'power' change

A proposed amendment limiting the Executive Council's power over General Council-originated legislation will be voted upon in the election on Wednesday.

According to the Constitution, two-thirds of the student body must approve the bill before it becomes law. It has passed both the Executive and General Councils by this margin.

The amendment would affect article four, section four, paragraph one of the Constitution. At the present time this reads:

"... Should the Executive Council approve a General Council-originated bill, but amend it or change it in any way, the bill shall be sent to the Student Body President, where it shall be signed into law within a ten-school day period."

This gives the Executive Council power to completely change the other council's bill, so that it in no way resembles the original bill.

The amendment would change this to read:

"... Should the Executive Council approve a General Council-originated bill, but amend or change it in any way, the bill shall be sent back to the General Council. The bill cannot become law until such time as both Councils agree on the wording of the bill. After such agreement, the bill shall be sent to the Student Body President, where it shall be signed into law within a ten-school day period."

This amendment provides that the Executive Council may change the bill, but that it must be returned to the General Council for approval.

This bill is the result of two versions by the councils. The original bill was introduced by the

General Council. It proposed that if the Executive Council changed the bill in any way, it would return to the General Council. This body could amend it again and send it to the Student Body President, by-passing the Executive Council.

After much discussion in the

Executive Council, the body amended it to read the way the bill is now stated, and returned it to the General Council.

This group defeated the bill, but the Executive Council again returned it and explained their reasoning. At this time, the General Council unanimously approved the amendment.
