The Generals lost to Jefferson by only 3 points in the first half, 75-72, while the Quakers downed the Blue and Gray by 10 in overtime.

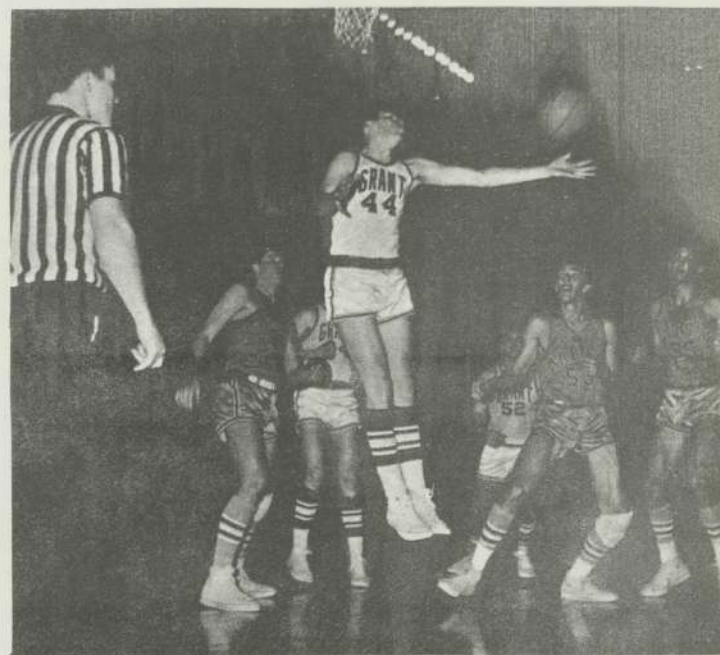
Jefferson relies chiefly on the talent of city scoring leader Gary Ladd, and the rebounding of 6'2" Don Shepherd.

Bowling together, the members are split into teams and they bowl among themselves. They will, however, be bowling against

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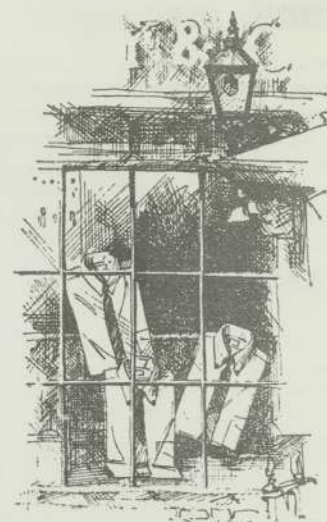
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
