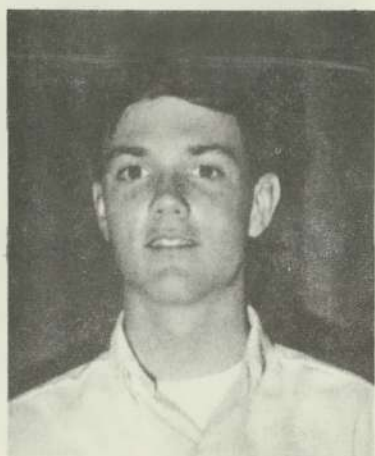

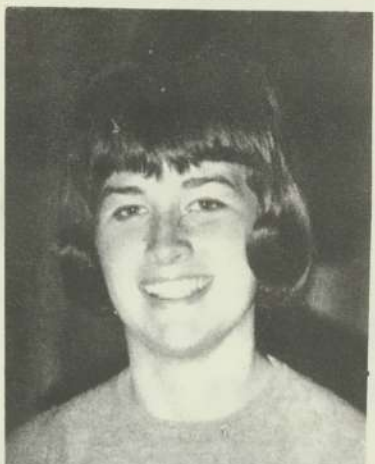

## Two candidates try post of athletic representative

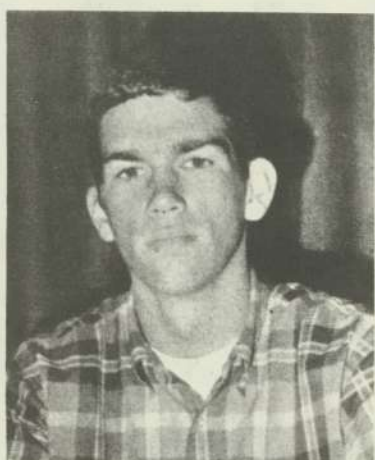
