Merit semi-finalists named

Seniors Anne Burson, Neil Jacobsen, Brian McCune, Martin Schnitzer and Christopher Swan have been named semi-finalists in the 1967-68 National Merit Scholarship program.

They are competing to become national merit scholars and will be judged on their grades, creative accomplishments, leadership qualities, extracurricular activities, school citizenship and test scores.

Semi-finalists scored the highest in each state on the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying test given last February.

The semi-finalists are young people of high intellectual potential, according to John M. Stalnaker, president of the National Merit Scholarship corporation.

Mr. Stalnaker stated, "From this group will come future leaders of business, industry and the professions."

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College representatives set for talks

Representatives from the state system of higher education will be here Wednesday to talk to senior students first and second periods.

Sessions will include representatives from the University of Oregon, Oregon State University, Portland State College, Oregon College of Education, Southern Oregon College, Oregon Technical Institute, University of Oregon School of Nursing, Portland Community College, and a special session in non-college training.

All seniors must attend two sessions about different schools. Those seniors not planning to attend college should spend one period in the session on non-college training and one period in a college session. (Portland Community College is suggested.)

Mrs. Elva Newcomer, col-

lege counselor, said, "It's impossible for every student to visit all these college campuses so the state system of higher education sends this team to acquaint all high school seniors with the educational opportunity that the state provides for them."

Course offerings, administration admission requirements, costs to attend, financial aids and scholarships and other pertinent information will be discussed in the sessions.

"If a student is seriously interested in talking to someone from a particular college, he should be sure to ask for a personal interview with the representative from that college," urged Mrs. Newcomer.

Personal interviews will be held following the sessions at 10:30 a.m. in the library.

Parents are invited to attend the visitations and are urged to discuss post high school plans with their sons or daughters both before and after the conference.

Cast as Judge Gaffney is Ernie Elkins, and Lofgren, the cab driver, played by Larry Spencer completes the cast.

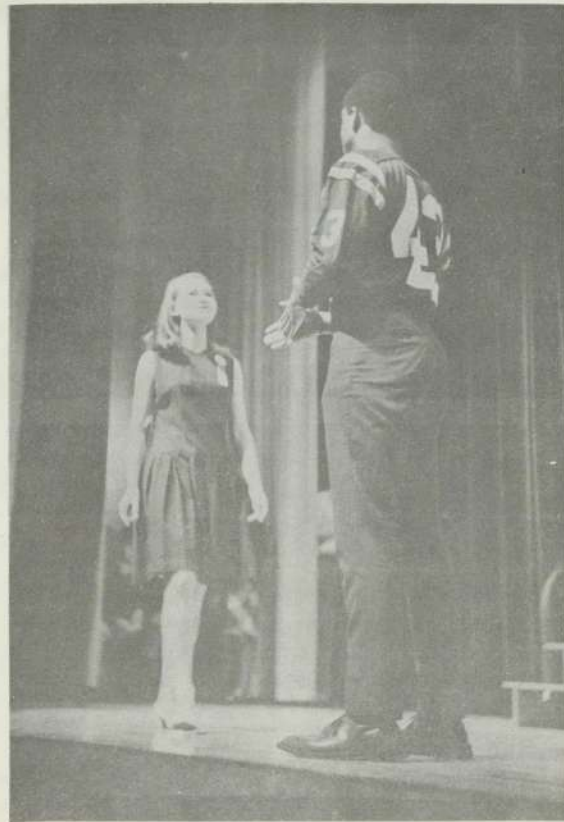
Assistant directors for the play are Debby LeDoux, Stephanie Daly and Mary Blossom.
