Councils approve new amendments

After passing the executive and general councils, three amendments to the school Constitution will be voted on in the election Thursday, according to John Stuckey, student adviser.

To update the Constitution is the purpose of one amendment. It deletes all references to Boys' league, Service Squad or the Inter-Club Council of Spirit and replaces Generalities for Pep Squad.

Clarifying the definition of elective offices is the purpose of an amendment concerning the By-Laws. The change would occur in Article III, section 4. "No person shall hold more than one position in any elective office at the same time," the Constitution now states. The amendment would add: "Elective offices include student body offices, class offices, Girls' league offices, rally or any office where 40% or more of the class votes."

The third amendment concerns the qualifications of rally members.

The amendment deletes the requirement of previous membership in Gendrills, Generalities, etc., and adds that the student must have good attendance, and the recommendation of his or her counselor, existing class teachers and the vice-principal in order to be considered.
