"A very poor defense and a slow start were the main reasons why we lost to Washington," commented Greg Schukart about the game with the Colonials last Friday.

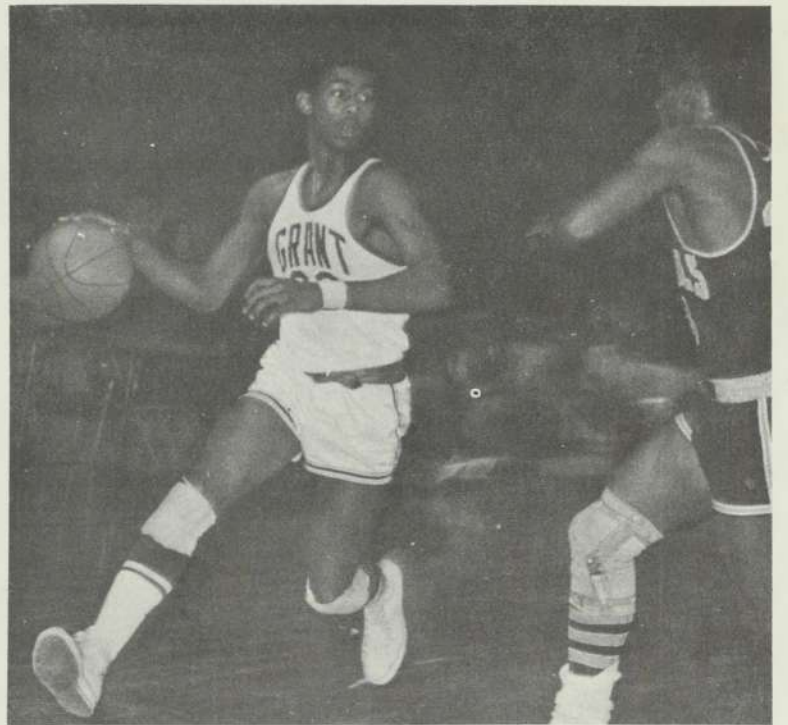
The loss to Washington was the first for the Sergeants, but they still remain in first place for their division.
