Season play ends May 16 even if all games haven't been played. The city playoffs will be held between the first and second half champions starting May 17. The state baseball games will begin May 24.

Varsity trackmen defeat tribe; state, season best records set

Although setting a State record in the discus and a season best in the shot, Cleveland's track team could not overcome Grant as the Varsity trackmen defeated the Tribe 85 2/3-50 1/3.

Robert Bates ran a 10.1 century in his first race and ran a 22.5 220 as he captured top honors in both events. Bruce McCormach toured the four lap circuit in 4:36.8 to take the mile over teammates John Adamovics and Scott Jackson who had times of 4:37.3 and 4:38.0

The 440 relay team improved its time by four tenths of a second over last time as they defeated the Indians with a time of 44.0. Bruce McCormach doubling back after winning the mile ran the 880 in 1:58.5 to make it two wins for the day.

Chuck Kinsey romped to a win in the two mile with a time of 9:42.5 over Don Johnson and Steve Gerrard with times of 10:17.0 and 10:35.6.

Ron Brown received twin wins in the high and low hurdles, as he overcame his opponent with times of 15.3 and 20.3

respectively. Barry Heidt vaulted 11'0" to win over two General companions.

Cleveland's Roger Smith set a state standard in the discus with a toss of 185'2". He also set a season's best with a heave of 61'7" in the shotput.

The Sergeants, coached by Gary Noble, defeated Cleveland 68-59 while the Freshmen tallied up their fifth win as they also defeated Cleveland 68-59.
