Scott's group will be traveling by train, and will carry all of their belongings in packs on their back. Each student will be given one thing to study and make a comparison on in all countries.

Along with 19 other students from throughout the United States, Julie Lind will participate in a summer program sponsored by the American school in Switzerland, located at Laguno.

Leaving New York for Zurich July 4, Julie will return August 28. While staying at the school, her party will attend classes for five days, studying the culture, language, and history of the country they are to visit, and
