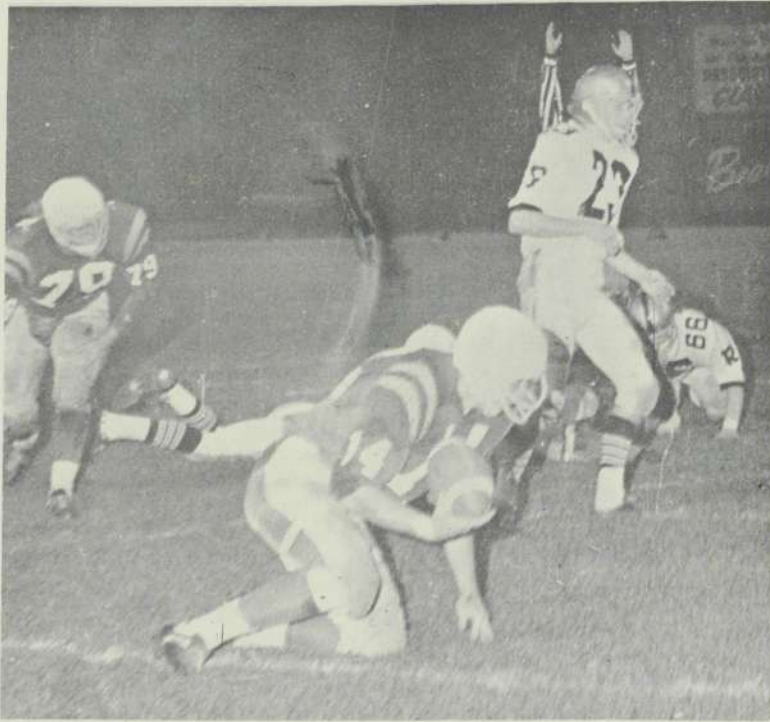

Coach Cotton pointed out Dave Weinecke of Lincoln and Mike Hann of Benson as being two of the toughest runners in the city besides the Generals.

Teddies unstuffed by Generals; encounter Minutemen Saturday

Before a crowd of 7,800 rain-soaked fans, Grant's Generals provided a needed double punch of touchdowns and outplayed Roosevelt 14-7, in a fifteen minute quarter of the Jamboree at the Civic Stadium last Friday.

When Coach Wolf's team entered the field to play their quarter, the score stood 8-0 for the Red Division. Grant then took advantage of Roosevelt's miscues and added 14 points for the Green Division. This brought the Green Division back in contention for the wrap up Saturday night.

The G-Men's two touchdowns came on runs by senior fullback John Percich and junior halfback Robin Sinclair. Percich on a one yarder and Sinclair on a four yard play. Specialist Glen "Golden Toe" Butherus kicked

both extra points.

The defensive team played a decisive game by letting Roosevelt get past Grant's 50 yard line only once, which was a pass. One key defensive play was contributed by lineman Larry Yakimi for blocking a punt in Roosevelt's territory and setting up a set of Grant downs which resulted in a touchdown.

Roosevelt's only scoring came on a 65 yard pass play with four seconds left on the clock.

Pre-game warmups were held on the Lincoln High field prior to the game for about half an hour, and then the team entered the stadium for the presentation of teams and bands. After the National Anthem, Franklin played Benson, Wilson encountered Lincoln and Grant played Roosevelt.

Green Division players were behind 15-14 when all had ended Friday night, but to the Generals it was a victory and a proud win over the Teddies.

Grant's victory over Roosevelt last Friday wasn't the only win they made, Grant took the Sportsmanship award for the two night P.I.L. jamboree.

Last Saturday night's action, which followed the same format as Friday's, but only different teams, ended up giving the Green Division a 28-14 overall victory over the Red Division.

Tomorrow's action begins at 1:30 at Marshall with the Generals taking on the Minutemen.

Last year's Division Championship game was played against Marshall. The game was a close one until the fourth quarter when Grant erupted for four touchdowns and 48-14 win. This year's Minutemen are improved and experienced and should prove to be a tough opponent, according to Coach Wolf.

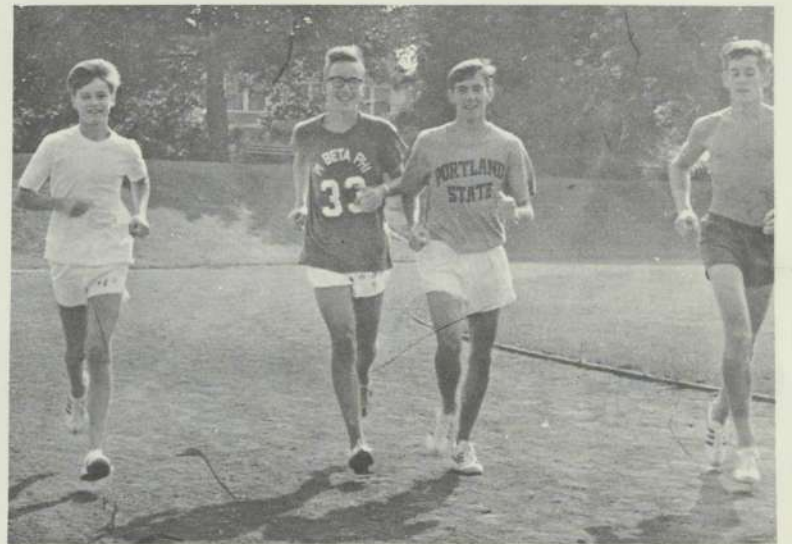

John Adamovics entered the 880 at the city level to become the JC Champ. He then went to take second in the state by running the race with a time of 2:01.3 which is the best time that John has had during his career.

Greg Schukart placed second in the city by flipping the discus 149 feet. Both Greg and John were entered in the junior division which includes 15 and 16 year old boys.

Former Grant High student Ron Brown entered both the high and low hurdles and became Sr. Division champ in both events at the city level. Ron then went on to take the high hurdles at the state level with a time of 14.0.

Jim Gilbert entered the 100 and 220 in the Jr. Olympics at the city level and captured both crowns. He then took the state crowns in the same events. Continuing on to the Regional meet he took first in the 220 and third in the 100. He then packed up to go to the National in the 100, 200 and 880 relay team but because of a lack of funds all three of his events were cut from the national meet except the first place winner in the 100.
