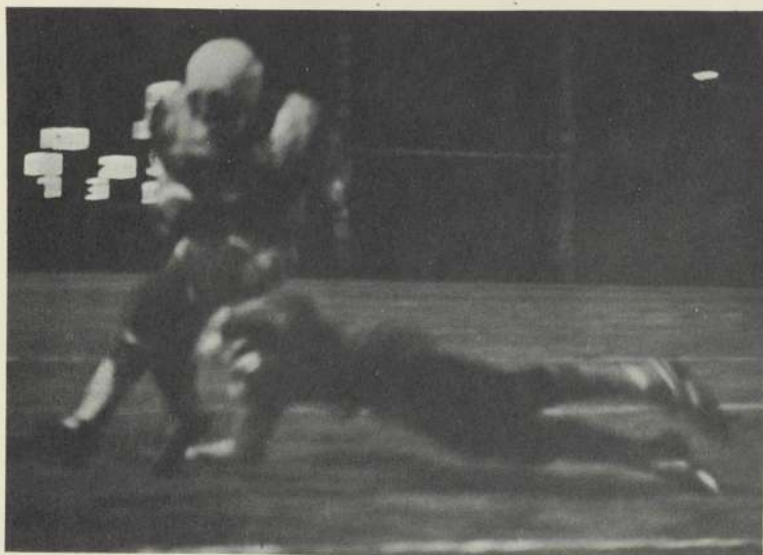
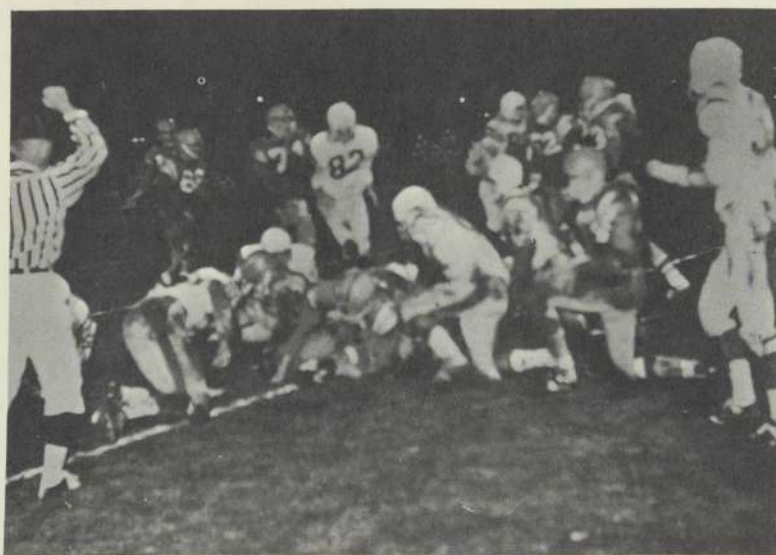

# G-Men manhandle Madison 27-14

**BALL, BALL**, who's got the ball? Generals came out on top in the all-important game against Madison last Friday night.

"We're rough, we're tough, they can't beat us" were the cries of the Grant student body as the Generals handed Madison their first loss of the season. The G-Men ripped through the Senators' defense to score four times in an hour and capture the Green Division lead.

Coach Frank Wolf's G-Men were the first to hit pay dirt as John Percich tore through the Senators' defense at the one yard line.

The play ended a three play drive which began when Dan Percich picked off a Senator pass at the 43 yard line and ran it to the nine, three plays later John popped over for the score. The PAT failed and the score at the end of the first period read Grant 6, Madison 0.

The next goal for the Generals came when Dan Percich ran into the Madison end zone from one yard out. The G-Men then gained the PAT when Bill Hjelm tossed a pass to June Jones inside the Madison goal line.

When asked how he liked the game coach Wolf replied, "How can you complain; it was great. How do you like scoring with five

seconds to go and nine seconds to go; it takes a pretty good quarterback to call it that way."

The first TD Wolf referred to was a 19 yard pass from Dan Percich to Robin Sinclair who zipped into the end zone for the score. The kick by John Percich added another point to the Generals' tally. This goal came with five seconds showing on the clock in the first half.

The other goal came with nine seconds left in the game when Bobby Bates slipped through the Madison defense and romped 57 yards for six more points. John Percich then kicked the extra point to end the scoring.

Madison's TD's came in the

second and fourth periods on one and 46 yard runs.

The first came on a one yard drive by Dean Tackett with John Baynard making the kick. The second came when Mark Davis picked up a Grant fumble and scrambled 47 yards for the score. John Baynard again kicked the PAT.

When asked to cite the outstanding players, coach Wolf stated, "Eleven defensive ball players." The next question was, "Anyone in particular?" to which he replied, "I said 11 of them."

Tonight the G-Men tangle with Cleveland who stand 1-1-1 for the season. The Indians rumbled with Jefferson last week in a duel which ended in a 26-26 tie. The Cleveland team is headed by Terry Amato, Walt Reynolds and Larry Lancaster.

## JV defeats Jeff; Frosh undefeated

By equaling the varsity's score of 7-6 over Jefferson, the JV football team remains undefeated this season. The team, coached by Robert Shewbert and Bill White, is now preparing to tangle with Cleveland next Thursday.

The Privates now prepare to face Cleveland who, according to coach Bill Graham, will be tough.

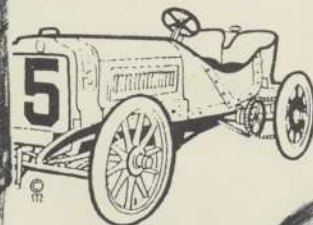

## Harriers win dual meet trophy; city championship lurks near

"We should be able to take it," stated coach Mark Cotton about the cross country city championship to be held at 4:00 p.m. today at Wilson.

According to Cotton, Ken Lite of Jackson and Dave Wienecke of Lincoln will provide tough competition for the Generals, as will Mike Hann of Benson, favored winner of the meet.

Scott Jackson, favored to be in the top three, has beat Lite, Brown, and Wienecke but has not met Hann's time.

There will be four divisions of competition: varsity, junior, sophomore, and freshman. Seven boys and an alternate have been chosen for each division.

On the varsity level, runners are: Scott Jackson, John Adomovics, Greg Shukart, Don Johnson, Mike Naylor, Steve Gerard, Jeff Klein, and alternate Bill Flowers.

Running for the junior level are: Tim Meyers, John Othus, John White, Frank Wall, Steve Crane, Steve Collins, Doug Boardman and alternate John Mears.

In the sophomore division, Doug Owens, Craig Breese, Gary Evans, Scott Bailey, Nick Rulli, Jeff Osbourne, Steve McCrary, and Lance Zaklan will run.

On the frosh level, Courtney Huff, Les Franz, Richard Stewart, Jerry Worlrich, Dan Stillwell, Ron Kotsovos, Steve Twedt, and alternate Dave Collins will compete.

In dual meet action last Wednesday, the Generals finished first in all three divisions against Madison, Franklins and Roosevelt and took the dual meet trophy with a 14-0 record.

Held at Fernhill Park, Scott Jackson placed first on the varsity level with a time of 12:33.2. Others who placed in the top five were Greg Shukart, John Adomovics, Don Johnson, and Mike Naylor. Only 26 points were made by the varsity harriers.

Mike Hann of Benson still holds the course record at Fernhill with 12:26.7 made in 1967.

A total of 18 points was accumulated on the JV level as they swept to victory. Their closest contender was Franklin with 68 points.

Howard Unkeles set a new course record as he finished in 9:54.7 to take first place for the Sergeants. Second place was taken by Frank Wall, fourth by Steve Crane, Doug Owens fifth, and Doug Boardman sixth to add to the victory.
