Attempt made to obtain money for transportation, equipment

For the first time in many years, an attempt is being made by members of the administration and Dad's Club to obtain more money for athletic equipment and band transportation from the school district.

A two-hour meeting was held November 19 in Dr. Roy Malo's office, between Hubert Shovlin, vice-principal of boys; Gust Kanas, vice-principal of curriculum; Vernon Butts, head of the athletic department; Frank Wolf, varsity football coach; Ray Feves, Dad's Club president; and Paul McCall, director of athletics, in order to discuss the matter.

Actually, the "more funds for athletics campaign" was launched about four weeks ago when a letter explaining the situation was sent to Mr. McCall from the Dad's Club.

The letter presented Grant's problem in six simple phases: 1) Grant has the greatest supporters and boosters in the Portland school system; 2) More Grant High district people support PIL events; 3) Grant has no home fields and must bus band and players to games; 4) Grant has no chance to receive money from concession stands.

It also stated that Grant's Dad's Club patrols games with no extra compensations; and Grant, being a large school, has more people turn out for athletics than a smaller school, yet receives about the same amount of funds as a smaller school.

The letter requested five areas in which extra funds be appropriated: A) Extra money for band transportation; B) for athletic equipment for practice gear for the many participants; C) for team transportation as there is no home field; D) for Dad's Club patrolling efforts which eliminate the hiring of extra officials; E) a compensation to Dad's Club in lieu of receiving no money from concession stands.

Generals dropped 14-6 in state quarter-finals

Despite the pouring rain and chilly weather, 7,003 students, parents, and interested fans were on hand November 15 to watch David Douglas present the Generals with their first and last defeat of the season.

The first quarter of the state quarter-final game showed the two teams battling on the field but getting nowhere. The Scots managed to get to the G-Men's 21 but were held there until Mike DeSylvia attempted a field goal. The kick went off to the side. This was the closest the Scots came to the Generals' goal during the first half, other than their touchdown.

David Douglas was the first to score as Don Palmer drove across from the one yard line on a keeper. Mike DeSylvia kicked the extra point for the Scots.

The Generals' score came in the fourth quarter after they started to move. Dan Percich flipped a lateral to June Jones who was on the sideline; Jones then tossed a pass to Bobby Bates who took it over his shoulder and proceeded to outrun a Scot to the goal line. This play made the score 7-6 for the Scots.

The Scots may have led the

first half but the Generals changed the situation in the second by stopping them from gaining any first downs while the G-Men picked up eight.

The second David Douglas touchdown came in the fourth period. It was set up by a fumble recovered on the Generals' seven yard line. Steve Hamilton gained the seven yards in one play to make the score 14-6.

"The boys did a lot better than they were expected to this season," claimed coach Wolf. "The competition was about as rough as it can get. I wouldn't want it any tougher," he added. According to Mr. Wolf the Generals were put in the strongest division this year. There will be 42 members of the team receiving varsity letters and will claim them at a banquet to be held at a later date.
