Students chosen to direct sixth grade at 'Outdoor School'

Fresh air, sunshine, and sixth graders are in store for the 30 Grant students who were selected to be counselors at the Spring Outdoor School. The school will be in session from April 6 to May 23, and there will be four camps operating simultaneously. A group of 18 students a week are needed for each camp.

500 high school students are being recruited from schools in Multnomah county. The guidelines that the school counselors follow in selecting candidates are: 1.) juniors or seniors in high school; 2.) capable students; 3.) students who would work well with sixth graders; 4.) students who will be interested in working in the out-of-doors.

To receive some training prior to attending the school, each of the students selected must attend a training session that is located at the assigned camp.

This program is dedicated to teaching the sixth graders their place in the natural environment and how science is applied to make their life better. The high school counselors' influence on the youngsters is great because they are at the impressionable age, and the children will be influenced by the counselor's attitudes, his ideas, and his leadership qualities.

Debbie Fifield, who will be a counselor, stated, "It will be a tremendous experience, both thrilling and trying. It will broaden our learning capacity and the learning and teaching experience will be good for all involved."

Elimination procedures under control of Royal Rosarian Festival committee

"For the last three years the Rose Festival Association people have come in and done all the elimination processes—down to the last six girls," explained Mrs. Melva Anderson, girls' vice-principal, when asked about the Rose Festival elimination processes for this year.

"WHEN THE last six girls are chosen, they are then prepared for the presentation assembly . . . the students vote . . . and the winning princess' name is announced," she continued. "The only part the faculty has in the eliminations is preparing the assembly and working out the presentation to the press."

William MacGibbon, of the Rose Festival Association, is in charge of the eliminations, which

will be held on March 11, 13, and 24, when the final six will be chosen. The presentation assembly will be on April 3, and the winning princess' name will be announced on April 9.

REQUIREMENTS the candidate must meet as outlined in the application form are: 1) Be a full time member of the 1969 graduating class, and a full time student, 2) have a GPA of 2.25 or better, 3) be unmarried, 4) not divorced, 5) no children, 6) have a good citizenship record, and 7 a good attendance record.

"Besides being responsible for the elimination," Mrs. Anderson commented, "the Rose Festival Association is also responsible for choosing their own judges. In the end the students do the final judging," she concluded.
