Lincoln, Flowers named All-City . . .

G-Men gain city crown

Pouring in 26 points apiece, Don Lincoln and Bill Flowers led the G-Men past Wilson 71-57, for the city championship and a berth in the State Tournament. The win gave the Generals the chance to meet North Eugene next Wednesday at the Coliseum in the first round of the tournament.

"They have a big team," stated Coach Rooney when describing the North Eugene cagers. "While they are big they are not fast. They play their game by having a tough defense," he added.

The North Eugene team on the average is taller than the Generals with their tallest member measuring in at six feet eight inches. According to Mr. Rooney the Eugene lineup will probably include: Steve Cross at center; Ken Barnhart, forward; Steve Van Ooteghan, forward; Jim Youel, guard; and Gary Douglas, guard. Steve Van Ooteghan is the team's top scorer and is the man to watch during the game. Another man who plays a great deal for Eugene is Rod Peterson.

The Eugene cagers play a zone defense most of the time which makes the opponents shoot from the outside. According to Coach Rooney this, should not cause much of a problem because the Generals have had to play against this

type of defense 90 per cent of the time this year.

"I think we should beat them," stated Mr. Rooney. "Judging from the way we have been playing we have a good chance," he added. "It is hard to tell how a team is going to play in the tournament until after the first game. If they can keep their poise they have a good chance of capturing the crown," he concluded.

The Trojans were the first to score in the game last Friday but the Generals quickly rebounded and pulled into the lead. The first quarter was very close with the score being tied several times throughout the period. As the buzzer rang the G-Men held a one-point edge.

The second period showed the Generals leading all of the way, capturing an 11-point lead at one time. The Trojans fought back but their effort was not strong enough to bring them closer than six points before the half ended.

The second half showed the Generals taking a commanding lead which the Wilson cagers could not attempt to break. In the third period the G-Men outshot the Trojans by five points and during the fourth quarter increased their 11-point lead to 14 and a final score of 71-57.

"The boys did not play as well against Wilson as they did against Madison," stated Coach Rooney. "One of the reasons is that they were under much more pressure and were a little tight because of it."

Coach Rooney cited Bill Flowers as doing the best overall, explaining that he has been im-

proving over the last few games. He also pointed out Don Lincoln as doing a fine job.

In a poll taken last week Don Lincoln and Bill Flowers were picked as standouts in the city and were voted onto the All-City team. Grant is the only school to have more than one player on the five-man team. Mike Naylor was picked to be on the second team while Artie Wilson was named to the third team.

Tennis, golf set opening; hope to retain city titles

Returning from last year as city champions the varsity golf and tennis teams are practicing in preparation for upcoming games.

"We have had difficulty practicing because of poor weather," stated Mrs. Virginia Behm, girls' tennis coach, "but we hope to have a good season."

With the addition of the current Oregon State champion, Kay Tokerud, the varsity team is the same as last year. Captain Myrna West and Secretary-Treasurer Sherrie Horning won the city open doubles championship earlier this year and Carolyn Lumber won the singles championship.

"Last year we won the city championship," informed Mrs. Behm, "and we hope to repeat it this year."

Ten girls have come out for tennis, seven of whom will be selected for the team. The team will be divided into three singles and two doubles teams. Matches will begin on March 27. The

first one will pit the Generals against Marshall. All of the matches will be held here every Tuesday and Thursday at 4:00 p.m.

In action on the golf scene the boys and girls will be participating in tournaments against other schools. The students usually practice their sport at their own club and do not practice as a group. The only time they play together is when they meet with other schools.

Girls start league play against Cleveland at the Rose City golf course April 9. Their second match is against Franklin, and their third against Roosevelt. All of the Grant matches will be played at Rose City golf course.
