Foreign students help at Carnival

Taking part in the General Council hootenany at the Spring Carnival, 21 foreign exchange students will visit the school Friday, staying in students' homes.

Arriving Thursday evening, the exchange students will participate in two talent assemblies Friday, then spend the rest of the day attending classes, to promote the carnival.

Both boys and girls, visiting throughout the Pacific area on the American Field Service program, will be present. A large number of countries—including England, Thailand, Norway, Brazil, Chile, Argentina, Colombia, Switzerland, Germany, Sweden, Australia, Egypt, Ethiopia, Italy, and Spain—will be represented.

The purpose of this visit, according to Nancy Swett, who was responsible for setting it up, is to bring the

idea of AFS out in the carnival, and to promote understanding between students of different nations.

The Spring Carnival, which is a main event each year, is designed to earn money to be used by our AFS committee—both to help finance students visiting here and those who are sent abroad. Although the decisions as to which schools receive and send exchange students are made back in New York, Grant almost always receives two, and has one that goes to another country.

Since it seems that we have such a good reputation for good families and good students, it is important that this reputation is upheld by providing sufficient funds to support these activities.
